FINAL COUNTRY MUSIC CAMP OUT 23 – 25 October 2009

The Leskes were eager to get away on the Friday night being the only two from Gawler 4WD Club wishing to attend the camp out with unpowerd sites. We joined Jane and John camping with the Nisson 4WD Club who made us feel extremely welcome in their group spending the remainder of the night mingling with other Nisson people and listening to country music before retiring to bed. Even though windy conditions prevailed, we erected the new Gawler 4WD banner draped over our caravan to show many other campers several 4WD clubs were present.

The official opening on Saturday was made by Dave Williams from Wellington. Dave is a long time supporter of the Blanchetown Country Music Camp Out and the Royal Flying Doctor Service where all the weekend proceeds will be donated to.

Saturday at 9.00 am, 16 vehicles lined up in convoy fashion waiting for land holders Arthur and Dorathy to give us a history 4WD tour through Bindmurra Station (the property the camp was held on).



Leskes and Jansens were among the 16 but over two days, the newly introduced 4x4 tour on the property, took 70 people on a five hour tour to look at crops, see homes of the early settlers hearing some of their stories, learn how the centre pivots work for potatoes crops, vineyards and how the property owners have changed their method of irrigation to accommodate the low water allocation.

Water tanks were put in the early 1900s when shepherds watched their sheep from Wild Dog's Hill at the station.

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Water holes dried up quickly so troughs were built.

The dog proof fence was paid for in their Council Rates and trappers would cut ears off dogs, foxes or dingos, present them to the Council, and get a refund.



Bindmurra was originally made up of 9 small settling houses totally then up to 1,000 acres but a lot larger today. This year's crops should bring in 3 - 4 bags to the acre – a good year should bring in 10 bags. This area is just outside Goyder's line with very light rainfall (average rainfall 6" or 150mls per year), but next year the station plan to try direct drilling. They would travel some 810kms each day in summer to check the water supply which could take

fence line.

Our tour continued to view charcoal pits and open cut Gypsum pits, but the highlight of the tour was driving over some rough ground and attempts to get vehicles up some steep sand hills.

We have since heard that Committee members have agreed the campout was one of the best. The weather stayed fine and the attendance was up on previous years by approximately 100 to 509.

The Saturday night camp oven tea of \$15 per head was served to 266 people with food and drinks available to purchase for the whole weekend.



\$62,000 had previously been donated to the Royal Flying Doctors over a period of 5 years. In 2004, the artists who performed in the first Camp Out signed their name on a blue denim shirt that was later put up for auction as a money raiser. This year the same shirt never been worn, was offered back to the committee, who made the unanimous decision to gift the shirt to Dave Williams. Dave has a museum of country music artist and mobilia, and he said he had just the perfect place for it to go on show.

Raffle tickets were available for sale, spinning wheel competitions and pony rides for younger children. MC was Noel Kneebone who constantly recognized the performing artist and a very long list of sponsors. Amenities included mobile toilets, generators for lighting and a few showers.

A Gospel concert was enjoyed by many who stayed. Only one more job to do before the committee can fold up as a fund raiser for the RFD is to audit the books, and make one final donation. A rather sad ending.

Mystery Drive – Sunday 15.11.09

With a forecast top of 40 degrees, the day was altered and shortened to suit the hot conditions. We met at the Gawler Visitors Information Centre at 8.00am (brought forward by 1 hour due to the heat) and with 6 diehard members; Brent and Keryn, Wayne, Bronte, Quenton and Deb (down from 14 originally on the trip sheet).

We set off up Gawler East soon turning onto dirt roads through Concordia. We travelled through quite pretty country including a water crossing and the delightful town of Rosedale. Continuing through Greenock and along the back roads to just north of Kapunda; turning off the Kapunda to Eudunda road onto Anlaby road and headed to the historic Anlaby Station.



Driving up the Gum studded drive we arrived at Anlaby Station. More like a village than a farm, our guide met us for our 9.00am tour of the homestead. The station was established in 1839 by Frederick Dutton soon becoming a reputable Merino sheep and Clydesdale horse stud.

The buildings and gardens of Anlaby are in the process of being restored and our guide showed us through most of the house including the kitchen, butler's pantry and scullery, the servant's domain and up the stairs to the main formal part of the house. We were shown original cupboards in perfect

working order, expensive drapes, original lighting, flooring, decorative imported timber panelling etc all over 100 years old.

Stories of Henry Dutton and son Geoffrey Dutton who ran the property through the years were told as our guide showed us through the various wings and cellars of the homestead. With no air conditioning and after 8 days of record November heat, the home was comfortably cool. The current owners, Andrew Morphett and his partner Peter Haywood have just purchased the original Woolshed back, and all members present are looking forward to a tour of the gardens and outbuildings as well as the Shearing Shed precinct sometime in the future. A short drive back to Kapunda and a drive through Dutton Park



(land donated by the original Dutton family) and a morning tea stop by the duck pond at Davidson Reserve.

As usual, Mystery day trips feature superb morning teas and again with a selection of yummy slices (from Angaston's Sunrise Bakery) and icy cold soft drinks, today was no exception!

The last stop on the tour was a look at the excellent "Light Region Interpretive Display" in the underground rooms of the historic Thompson Building (formally Thompson's Store built in the 1860s). A well put together display – well worth the look.

Everyone agreed, despite the heat, the day was very enjoyable.
