

Tickets will start to be sold from our <u>October meeting</u> at \$2 per ticket and the raffle will be drawn at the AGM on 13 December 2013.



MONTHLY RECIPE

With the holidays coming, decided to leave the recipe in one more month as it appears to be a handy recipe to have on an extended trip

Bush Bread Making

This recipe has been taken from Westprint Friday Five dated 30.8.2013 provided by a reader named Dieter.

This is a recipe for leaven bread that has been used over and over again with excellent results. If you are afraid to burn it in a fire camp oven you can use one of those collapsible steamer tray and steam the bread, good bread but without a crisp crust.

Campers' Bread

- 4 cups white flour (baker's flour)
- 2 satchels dried yeast
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- 1 tablespoon oil
- 1 ½ cups of water (blood warm or tepid)

Method:

Mix ½ cup warm water and yeast. Let stand until it bubbles. Combine all the ingredients keeping ½ cup of flour aside for kneading. Knead into a smooth dough until it feels right on a floured board. Let rise in a warm place until doubled

Punch down or knead a bit. Place in baking trays and let rise until doubled. Bake until done OR you can steam it.

Bake in preheated over 180oC for 45 minutes or until cooked

Use your imagination

Of the four cups of flour replace one with oats, rye flour, polenta, potato flour etc.

"Most often I bake on loaf of bread with one half and use the other half to make a sweet product."

Cinnamon Buns

Use the same recipe after the first rising and roll out until about 12.mm thick(ish)

Spread butter onto the dough. Sprinkle with cinnamon sugar and dried fruit or sultanas. Roll into a log and cut across the log in 2.5cm slices. Place slices or rounds on greased tray and let rise.

Bake 180oC 30-40 minutes to make cinnamon sultana scrolls.

Brush top with warmed honey and sprinkle with icing sugar or separate the dough into many little lots put goodies inside and close.

Allow to rise and steam or bake. Pork buns, date buns etc.

Tip:. The engine bay after a day's driving is the perfect place to allow the dough to rise – works best if the bonnet is closed to keep heat in.

IDEAS AND INFORMATION

Maralinga

The atomic bomb test site at Maralinga in SA is now open for visitors following the radioactivity clean up of recent years. Host, Robin Matthews, the site manager, conducts full day tours with a fascinating and, at times alarming, story to tell about the activity on the site and takes guests to the very spots where the test explosions took place in the 1950's.

The bomb testing project was huge and we were left wondering why Australians knew so little about what was happening and the risks that were being taken. The impact on the aboriginals was deplorable. Camping with ample space is available at the near deserted Maralinga township site and there are basic cabins available.

Fuel Outlets Close

Please note that the Grasshopper Roadhouse, Tarlee, closed last week and, consequently, there no fuel available in Tarlee.

It's probably old news to some of you but there is no fuel available in Freeling either.

Kitchen Hints -

Picking up a dropped egg - If an egg breaks on the kitchen floor, sprinkle salt on the mess and leave it there for 20 minutes. You'll be able to wipe it right up.

Eliminate a grease fire - Pour salt on top to smother it. (Never use water on a grease fire.)

Keep potatoes and apples from turning brown once they're sliced - Put them in salted cold water.

Clean up oven spills - If food boils over onto the oven floor, sprinkle salt on top to stop smoke and odour from forming. When the oven is cool, it'll be easy to brush away the spot.

Make cream whip more easily and egg whites whip faster and higher - Add a pinch of salt.

Clean coffee and tea stains from china cups - Rub them with salt.

Clean a cutting board - Cover it with bleach and salt, scrub it with a stiff brush, then rinse with very hot water and wipe with a clean cloth. Repeat with each use.

Test for rotten eggs - Put an egg in a cup of water to which you've added two teaspoons of salt. A fresh egg will sink, but one that's iffy will float.

Clean a glass coffee pot - Fill it with 1/4 cup of table salt and a dozen ice cubes. Swish the mixture around, let it sit for half an hour, fill it with cold water and rinse.

Clean tarnished copper. - Fill a 16-ounce spray bottle with hot white vinegar and three tablespoons of salt. Spray it onto the copper, let it sit briefly, then rub clean. (Don't do this to lacquered copper.)

My favourite place

By Quenton Policeman's Waterhole – Coopers creek Innamincka

Listening to Mike Steel from the Innamincka General Store quite a few years ago describe to Ian McNamara on "Australia all over" the volume of water crossing the Innamincka causeway during a big flood of the Cooper, I knew this was a place I wanted to see. Since then I have visited the area several times and have seen it during flood and drought.

My first impression was how big this creek actually is. With large majestic gum trees lining the banks and in places a wide deep expanse of water, it looks remarkably similar to the Murray River.

Our favourite camp spot is at Policeman's Waterhole, only a few kms downstream from Innamincka Township. A perfect setting amongst large shady gum trees, grassed area (natural lawn after flooding) and a sandy beach. Close enough to town to canoe in (for a beer and ice-cream) and far enough away from the throng of campers at the town common. A great place to enjoy fishing, canoeing (hire canoes from pub) and just relaxing.

We have seen the AIM Hospital building transform from a towering ruin on our first visit to a faithfully restored beautiful building now housing historical displays and Rangers headquarters. Nearby Innamincka Hotel comes alive on Friday nights with many tourists and local station hands enjoying the excellent food and party atmosphere. This is where we watched the opening ceremony of the Sydney Olympics in 2000. "Greg" the Hotel pig (now gone to fly with other pigs) entertained the bus loads with her beer drinking routine. The new Outaminka Bar & Dining room is equal to any modern country pub.

Other attractions we have enjoyed include Cullyamurra Waterhole (including Aboriginal rock etchings,) Burkes, Wills and Kings Markers, the Dig Tree and of course Coongie Lakes.

On a couple of visits we drove on the newly re-opened Walkers Crossing PAR as an alternative route to Birdsville. However by taking this track, you miss out on seeing the historic Cordillo Downs Woolshed with its newly restored curved roof.... Ah well...Always leave something to see on the next trip, I always say!

Registered Training Organisation (RTO) Status - Update

The DTU has signed an agreement with another RTO. This means that we can continue with nationally recognised training again. As of today, we can also start selling manuals again.

The training process will not change at all. All current documentation that needs to be completed for training is still required. These are the attendance sheets, feedback sheets and OH&S assessment of the training site.

The standards of training will be kept at the current level. The quality and standard of training will therefore not change due to another RTO issuing the certificates. We will also continue to only train those who are members of a club affiliated to 4WDSA.

The costs to trainees will not increase. The DTU will absorb the costs to the RTO. This will be reviewed at a later date, but is unlikely to change for around twelve months.

For the issuing of certificates, books will need to be sent to the DTU. The ASQA feedback sheet will also need to be sent in. This is available from the 4WDSA website. If it not supplied, the book will be rejected. It is a requirement by the RTO that the ASQA feedback sheet is completed for each certificate issued.

The certificates will be sent to the DTU by the RTO and forwarded to the trainee as with current certificates.

As we are continuing to offer nationally recognised training, trainers and assessors will need to maintain their currency. This involves continually being involved with training, doing professional development and getting their books audited.

We are unable to train new trainers and assessors. Those that want to become DTU trainers and assessors will have to do these courses with another RTO.

The driving component of the advisor course will be re-introduced. This is to ensure that the trainer / assessor have sufficient driving knowledge and capability to train to the standard the DTU requires.

It will be possible, and recommended, that those that want to become DTU trainers or assessors complete the driving component with the DTU before they do the trainer or assessor courses. We do not want someone to go through the effort and cots of completing the trainer or assessor course to find the DTU do not rate their driving capability as sufficient.
