#### **General conditions**

Check road and weather bulletins and local conditions before travelling into the Outback. Speed limits of 40km per hour apply within all Parks. For up to date public road information outside of National Parks, please call the Transport SA Road Condition Hotline on 1300 361 033 or visit the Transport SA web site on <a href="http://www.dpti.sa.gov.au/OutbackRoads">http://www.dpti.sa.gov.au/OutbackRoads</a>

For further information regarding South Australia's national parks visit our website <u>www.parks.sa.gov.au</u>. For information regarding air tours phone the Wadlata Outback Centre on 1800 633 060. Check local conditions before travelling into the Outback area.

Be aware that entry to Desert Parks requires a permit or a Desert Parks Pass that must be displayed on the vehicle windscreen.

#### **Tallaringa Conservation Park**

The Department of Defence has announced future closures of the Anne Beadell Highway on 20 July – 2 August 2015, 2 – 29 November 2015, 29 February – 13 March 2016, and 16 – 29 May 2016.

When the park is open, in addition to a DEWNR entry/camping permit or a Desert Parks Pass, a tourist access permit is also required to access this area from the Department of Defence. #### CORRUGATIONS



If you have ever driven the length of the Gibb River Road in the Kimberley, you would have had many hours to think about corrugations. Way back in 1994, I wrote a column in a 4WD magazine about road corrugations. I described the 1962 experiments of Keith B. Mather from the University of Melbourne, who did some clever experiments and came up with a theory about how corrugations formed.

Since then, many people have contacted me about their experiences and theories about corrugations. Some of them have spent several decades driving on corrugations every day. A few have spent years doing experiments on corrugations, and have even published booklets about them.

Over the years, one thing I have discovered in trying to understand natural phenomena is that there are usually a few explanations - not just one single explanation. When I wrote my story about corrugations, I thought that Mather had solved the problem of how they form. But now that SO many people have corresponded with me, and I have also read more widely, I think that his explanation is a small part of the answer. In fact, I strongly suspect that we (ie, road engineers) don't fully understand corrugations!

Now the first thing to realise is that Outback dirt roads are not the only surfaces that get corrugations.

We all know how irritating and bone shattering corrugations can be but did you know how they were formed? Perhaps the following will shed some light on the subject:

You can see corrugations on bitumen and even concrete roads - usually after some kind of break in the road surface.

You can also see corrugations on steel railroad lines. The train can make so much noise going over these corrugations, that railroad people call these sections of track "roaring rails".

There are corrugations on the overhead metal rails that feed power to electric trains and trams. These vehicles have a "pantograph" on top - to carry the electricity between the overhead rails and the train. These overhead rails have tiny corrugations with tiny valleys and hills. The little valleys are where the pantograph broke contact from the overhead rail, and set up an electric arc that vaporised away some of the metal.

Skiers in the snow country often find rough corrugated washboard patterns on a welltravelled ski trail. And if you ever have replaced noisy wheel bearings, you'll see regular wear patterns (= corrugations) on the rollers, balls or track.

Keith B. Mather did an experiment to try to understand why roads get corrugations. He put a small wheel on a metre-long arm, and then drove it with a variable-speed electric motor around a circular concrete track. He covered the track with different materials - fine-sifted sand, different coarse sands, and various dry products like gravel, rice grains, and even split peas and sugar! He found that provided that these materials were dry and not stuck together, he could always generate corrugations.

He found that corrugations formed rapidly with hard tyres, but slowly with soft tyres. The corrugations were produced very easily in dry materials, but very slowly, if at all, in wet sand. It made no difference to the corrugations if the wheel was a driving wheel, or a driven (or rolling or idling) wheel. In his experiments, the major factor in making corrugations was the road speed of the vehicle.

So here is Mather's theory of corrugations.

It's based on the fact that you can never make a road perfectly smooth. There will always be tiny little bumps. Once his wheel got up to about 6-7 kph, it would bounce up when it hit a tiny bump. As the wheel came down and hit the sand, it would spray sand both forwards and sideways off the track, leaving behind a little crater. This crater would then be the valley of a corrugation. As the wheel came up out of the valley, it would jump into the air again, and so the pattern of valley-and-mountain would repeat itself.

Making corrugations is a two-stage process - first the corrugations establish a stable pattern, and then they spread along the road.

Mather saw that the first few corrugations to appear on the "smooth" road were quite shallow, and very close to each other. But as the corrugations got deeper, they gradually moved away from each other, until their height and their distance apart had settled into a stable pattern. Once this stable pattern of corrugations was set up, then the entire pattern of corrugation would migrate down the road in the direction of travel of the wheel. In the Australian Outback, engineers have seen corrugations heading in opposite directions on each side of the road from (say) a cattle grid, with each set heading in the direction of travel of the cars.

How come all the corrugations look the same, if the cars are all different? Most of the vehicles travel around the same speed. So, a bump on the road that makes one car's wheels bounce, will also make any wheels bounce. other cars' These bouncing wheels will all tend to land at the that's how the same point. And corrugations form.

Of course, the faster the road traffic, the further apart are the corrugations. French engineers working in the fast and flat desert roads of North Africa found corrugations that were about one metre apart. Mather found that Australian corrugations in Australia were about 0.75 metres apart.

And that seemed to be the perfect explanation - until the mail/phone calls/emails started flooding in!

The other explanations for corrugations involve engine resonance, wind (either natural or created by the moving vehicle), wheel hop, braking, acceleration, the road itself shrinking as it dries out, the wave of dirt pushed in front of the tyre, and the influence of shock absorbers.

## **Bogged plane at Lake Eyre to stay. – South Australia**

A light plane that bogged in Lake Eyre will remain as an outback relic after a rescue attempt went spectacularly wrong. The seaplane sunk in the mud after a forced landing three weeks ago, but attempts to rescue the passengers and crew and retrieve the seaplane itself, unfolded in such a comedy of misfortunes that the survivors are counting their blessings.

"We could have survived out there with some food and water," said David Geers, pilot of the doomed aircraft, who was travelling with two passengers "But it was the water that was the concern, as we'd run out.

We had decided to track up to the top end of Lake Eyre, and then follow the lake down to William Creek. On the previous leg to Innamincka we had quite a strong head wind, unfortunately. We probably had enough fuel on board, but one of the other aircraft travelling with us had some fuel in containers, so we elected to do a precautionary landing in the lake.

I touched down, and we probably rolled for about 70 to 80 metres on the surface without incident. But it was just when I pulled the power from the engine that it started to sink into the mud. We were very close to the middle of the lake. The top of the water had a beautiful crystallised surface, which was about 10 millimetres thick. Underneath that was this clay; wet, sticky mud, which trapped the plane."

The lake had appeared deceptively welcoming, the glittering surface disguising the thick bog immediately below. Realising he was in danger of sinking, Mr Geers contacted his friend Doug who was flying an accompanying aircraft.

The other aircraft continued flying to William Creek to raise the alarm, while Mr Geers set off the EPIRB (Emergency Position-Indicating Radio Beacon) and using his Spot tracking device, sent a preprogrammed message to his wife saying that they had landed safely but needed assistance."

A rescue helicopter soon arrived, but hopes for a speedy rescue were dashed when the chopper itself fell victim to the harsh outback conditions. The helicopter landed but as it was shutting down there was an overtemp situation. For safety reasons, they didn't want to take back off without engineers taking a look at it. So they radioed for another helicopter to fly out from Moomba. Now there were five people stranded on the lake. Afternoon turned to night, during which time they ran out of water and became concerned.

With no moonlight, the only illumination coming from the stars, the five castaways were effectively stranded in the middle of a hazardous inland lake (in 2010, an ABC helicopter crashed in Lake Eyre during a night flight, claiming three lives).

It was almost 10pm when the survivors were relieved to hear the sound of the approaching chopper which soon landed providing much needed fluids.

But the debacle was far from over.

While the passengers and crew were airlifted to safety, the attempted retrieval of the seaplane four days later almost ended in disaster. A helicopter flew from Kununurra in Western Australia and the plan was to sling the plane out. Mr Geers takes up the story:

"The helicopter, took off, and everything looked perfect, my aircraft being towed in a straight and level position underneath the helicopter. But, five nautical miles from where we were, my aircraft started to fly. The aerodynamic pressure on the towed fixed-wing aircraft began to exert itself, causing the plane to 'fly' of its own volition, its unpredictable yawing and rolling posing a serious danger for the pilot of the chopper.

Howard, the pilot, said one minute it was underneath where it was supposed to be, the next minute it was out near his left window, and then it was out to his right. The outcome probably would have continued to get worse and would have taken his helicopter down as well, so he decided to release the cord and let my plane go free."

Mr Geers said there was a brief moment of hope as the seaplane appeared to be preparing for a perfect landing. "My aircraft continued flying. It was quite surprising, as there was still a chance for maybe a recovery if the plane landed reasonably OK. But it only flew for a while, before dipping its left hand wing and doing a spiral back into the lake surface."

While Mr Geers is relieved that nobody was injured in the entire affair, he is devastated at the loss of his beloved Searey seaplane, which will now remain as a monument to the capricious nature of flight in the Australian outback.


