

We were the last generation to actually believe that a lady needed a husband to have a baby. No wonder people call us 'old and confused' and say there is a generation gap.



SNAKE REMINDER

Our local vet at the Gawler South Small Animal Hospital has just sent out a timely reminder to pet owners around Gawler to be watchful for snakes as the weather warms up.

As we know both cats and dogs are quite curious when they see something in the garden and would probably approach a snake as something to "play" with, with dire consequences. Most snake bites will probably be from a brown snake and the



effects of its venom are frequently lethal and can be very rapid.

The venom is a potent neuro-toxin and can quickly result in respiratory and cardiac failure. Although cats can take several hours to become affected, dogs can die within half an hour of being bitten.



If you suspect or know that your pet has received a snake bite, take it to your local vet as quickly as possible and phone ahead to let them know that you are on your way.

To help avoid a pet and snake confrontation, make sure that the grass around your property is mown and don't leave piles of wood or rubbish lying around as that is where snakes are likely to be found.

HAVE YOU HEARD OF THE NACKEROOS??

Some of you may already know but if, like me, you think it has something to do with

horses, read on:

In the southern states a secret unit of army personnel were formed called the North Australia Observer Unit (NAOU or, as nicknamed, Nackeroos or Curtin's Cow boys.) They consisted of about 550 people, all volunteers to live in the north, and to "observe and report" on Japanese landings; then wait to operate as commandos behind enemy lines.

The area of operation was 3.8 million square kms containing 5600 kms of coastline from Onslow in Western



Australia, to Normanton in Queensland and as far south as Alice Springs. The Government expected the invasion to be within a few weeks. They did not expect them to come back alive'. They were given 10 weeks to form, and be operational in the North in the bush. They were to use horses, donkeys, small boats, trucks, bicycles and motor cycles.

They made it. Arms were whatever they could get and it was a sort of BYO. It included shotguns and .22 calibre firearms for living off the land. They managed to survive for three years in country which had only been recently explored; country that was unmapped; and in country that aborigines had only a few years before that fought with the white man.

Yet with a little assistance of local aborigines and a few NT Mounted Troopers (NT Police) acting as guides, they survived for three years. They observed, reported on enemy movements on land, sea or air and they assisted in rescues of airmen shot down by enemy aircraft.

Today NORFORCE have adopted and wear the orange and green double diamond colour patch of the Nackeroos.

Somewhere in Australia Poem:

(anonymous Nackeroo poem)

Somewhere in Australia where the sun is like a curse. And each day is followed by another slightly worse. And the brick red dust blows thicker than the shifting desert sand And the men dream and wish for a fair and greener land.

Somewhere in Australia where the mail is always late. Where a Christmas card in April is considered up-to-date. Where we never have a pay day and we never pay the rent. But we never miss the money cause we never get it spent.

Somewhere in Australia where the ants and lizards play. And a hundred fresh mosquitoes reinforce the ones you slay. So take me back to good old Sydney where I can hear the tramway bell. For this God-forsaken place is just a substitute for hell!

NORTH AUSTRALIA OBSERVATION UNIT

The article below is from Barry Frew and appears in the May edition of the Citation Magazine in 2008.

Between 1939 and 1945 the total strength of the NT Police was 62 men. Fifteen men left to enlist in the Armed Services. Another twelve with aboriginal trackers and aboriginal personnel were seconded for duties with an Army unit known as the North Australia Observation Unit. Members of the unit nick-named themselves the Nackeroos. Others called them "Curtin's Cowboys".

The idea of a "special unit" originated at a meeting of Australian and American Intelligence Officers in early March of 1942. Singapore had fallen. Troops in Timor were retreating and Darwin was being bombed daily.

The Japs were coming and nothing was stopping them. Prime Minister Curtin was calling it the Battle for Australia and was asking Churchill to release Australian troops to defend the mainland of Australia. Military personnel were discussing a retreat to the Southern States to defend Australia as they did not think they could defend the whole northern Australian coastline.

This special surveillance unit was to be volunteer bush men who could be at first coast watchers for enemy landings and, after the invasion, be left behind enemy lines to continue the fight. Their chances of survival were slim.

The person designed to be in command was a young anthropologist who in 1932 studied with aborigine groups in the Northern Territory and was an advisor to the War Cabinet. He was told to raise a unit of about 450 bushmen who could ride and live in the bush.



Some came from disbanded Light Horse Regiments; some were returned servicemen, trained but bored and ready to volunteer for the next challenge.

Dr. Stanner asked the NT Police Force for police officers along with their Police Trackers because of their knowledge of the bush and their experience from living in the isolated Territory.

All groups were in position by September, just in time for the flooding wet season of the north. Their transport was to be horses, donkeys, mules, trucks and eight boats (under. I5metres). Their armament was left over rifles, shotguns, small amount of firearms from different countries and whatever you could bring yourself.

They endured isolation, flies, crocodile attacks, mosquitoes, hunger, thirst, sometimes only Morse code to communicate with their headquarters, and the knowledge that they were expendable.

Without the skills of the aborigines, the patrols could not survive. But survive they did until disbandment in 1945

Course costs

The course costs are very good value for what you receive. For the practical driving events you receive one on one training and assessment in your vehicle by a DTU Training person. The DTU reimburses their Training Officers for their fuel costs so this is part of the cost you pay and the other is the property access fee paid to the landowner for Callington and Peake.

To do the Basic Driving and Recovery course and the practical training events you will need to purchase a set of training manuals which consists of a comprehensive reference manual and a training checklist.

Ute didn't even look like bumping their bums.


Up and down the hill sin and out of the creeks up and over or around the rocks we went and around the
