#### Murray Mallee trip 14 -17th April 2017

#### Friday 14<sup>th</sup> April 2017

Meeting at the visitor's centre for a 7am start were Sandra & Pete, Martin & Brian, Bronte & Norma, Keryn, Brenton & Wil, Mick & Kylie, Sandra & Wayne. Roy & Bronwyn met us at Coonalpyn. All raring to go for a fantastic weekend of 4WD, fun and laughter.

The fog was so thick in places that we were wondering who was in front of us. But, boy oh



boy, fantastic photos.

Made our way to Coonalpyn and where we were in for a surprise!!!!!! Cars and people everywhere what a busy town now! Not bad for a town that most people just drove through.

The silos are just magnificent; when we were there a month ago the artist Guido van Helten was just using a spray can of paint standing on a cherry picker. He would just toss the empty can to the

ground, look at a piece of paper/ photo then carry on spraying again, such talent. I wonder if he was a graffiti artist as a teenager?????? The paintings look realistic and they are of local children from the school, as he says that the children represent the future of the town.





They also have other art work throughout the town, a great eagle's face as you head out of town on a fence, small metal tabs of different colours. They had a small market as well. After having a fantastic waffle and hot choc for me, with everyone fuelling up on coffees and food on offer, we headed off on the back roads to come back out on the highway at Lameroo. Short trip down the highway to Pinnaroo for fuel then off over the border to Murrayville.

We were very lucky with Pete bringing wood and Bronte the half 44-gallon drum, so we could have some great fires at night to sit around, and it was cold the first night.

#### Saturday 15th April 2017

Woke from a very cold night, everyone up and raring to go on an adventure around the Pink Lakes, Sunset National Park. Sun shining, sky blue, birds singing and the frigging rooster had been crowing since sunrise. It's a beautiful day.

Headed out along the Mallee Highway and then turning onto Sunset Road, 1st stop Linga trig point which gave us a great view over the country side. What a beautiful country we live in. grasshopper." He would load up the carcasses, cover them with broken Mallee branches and hopefully the leaves shaking up and down over the meat would keep the blowflies from settling!!!!!!! You can see at different areas the regeneration of the scrub after bushfires as we drove through the park.

After lunch we took off and decided to take a short cut which, it turned out, was not that good of a short cut. We still got to see the beautiful country side.


Stopped at Lake Crosbie for a look and out on to the Salt Lake for some photos. The camping area was quite full, looks like you have to get in early for a spot. Lucky we stopped as Kylie and Mick lost a bolt from their bull bar, so it was a bit of "bush mechanics" to fix. Called into Cowangie homestead for a look around, still an interesting place. Another building has been restored which is good to see.

Back to camp for tea at the hotel which was so disappointing, poor Kylie was eating her meal after everyone had finished and was not even able to get the meal she ordered!! Headed back to the caravan park for drinks and the fire to cheer ourselves up. and make sure our nest were ready for the Easter bunny in the morning.

#### Sunday 16<sup>th</sup> April 2017

Unzipping the camper and staring out bleary eyed to be greeted by Easter eggs everywhere. Tasted good for breakfast. Having to get an independent judge, I picked a caravan and knocked. Along this track is the old Border Fence made from wire netting and iron droppers, it began in the 1887 to try and keep vermin out of the farming lands. Lots of potatoes are grown in this area with the centre pivot irrigators. They can get two crops a year. Turned off the track to look at areas where the returned soldiers were given land to begin a new life after the war. Pretty harsh in the middle of the desert. Would have



been such a hard life. Next on the track was an old eucalyptus plant for making oil, which was



started in the 40's. Stayed here for a while looking around as aninteresting place with lots of rusty artefacts lying around. Wil and Keryn had a small metal detector which kept them busy where ever we stopped. Found a few really great camping spots for future reference, one that we stopped for lunch. Wil found a black cricket which was quite large, black and different. Headed to the Rock Holes which was really stinky, something had been dead in there for a while.

Back to camp for happy hour and again a fire. Lot of laughing as we played "celebrity heads." Just trying to see each other in the dark was hard enough let alone being able to see what people were.

Thank you everyone for a fantastic long weekend. See you next time.



#### History of the Blinman Mine

With apologies to Deb Earl, herewith, is the full text of the article Deb sent to us part of which was omitted in last month's Newsletter. Enjoy!

#### History of Blinman Copper Mine - Guest Speaker Geoff Randall

At our March meeting we were fortunate to have Geoffrey Randall speak at the club meeting on the History of the Blinman Copper mine 1859-1916.

The book Geoff wrote on the Blinman Copper Mine was part of his work as an Honors student at Adelaide University and he has a Bachelor Degree in Environmental Studies, History and Social Sciences which is quite an achievement. The story below is taken in part from his talk and the rest from his book and is only a select history of the mine. Geoff's book is still available to buy so if you are interested please contact the committee for details.

In 1859 the area east of the area now known as the Blinman copper mine was used for sheep grazing and it was a one legged shepherd named Robert Blinman who noticed the green stained rock on a nearby hill. From this discovery he set about filing for a mineral claim of the area at a cost of 5 pounds and convinced three others to join him in this venture. This syndicate of Robert Blinman, Alfred Frost, Joe Mole and Henry Alford worked a small section of the claim which they sold to the Yudanamutana Copper Mining Company for 6000 pounds. Robert Blinman or "Peg leg Bob" used his profit to begin a wood carting business and later a hotel licensee in the Flinders Ranges and he is buried at the Quorn Cemetery.

The mine was officially opened on September 5th 1862 with Captain Thomas Anthony as the manager, a Cornish Mine Captain, who brought experienced Cornish miners with him from Kapunda, Burra and Moonta.

Water, or lack of it, was an issue for the Blinman mine and water was eventually sourced from a bore 8 kms south of the town and piped to the mine where it was stored in tanks and dams. This water source was also used for the town. However the costs involved with transport, infrastructure and wages meant that although the mine was most productive between 1862 and 1880, it was not a profitable venture for the company and the Yudanamutana company changed its name in 1872 to the Blinman Consolidated Copper Mining Company and in 1880 employed a new manager Captain W J Paul. However by 1881 Blinman mine was in need of further capital investment and was taken over by the Corporation of South Australian Copper Mines Limited.

The mines Managing Director Mr T A Massey modernised the mine and boilers were brought from the recently defunct Prince Alfred Mine near Belton (NE of Carrieton) via the newly laid northern railway to Parachilna and then by road haulage to Blinman. The official reopening of the mine in May 1882 was celebrated with an official dinner and the announcement that Captain William Bryant was to supersede Captain Paul as mine manager.

The drought of 1883/84 significantly reduced the stock feed that teamsters relied on whilst carting ore from Blinman mine to Parachilna this, with a downturn in ore prices, meant the mine was in danger of closing. However the drought broke in late 1884 and a considerable input of money through the sale of debentures occurred, thus the mine was to be upgraded with the purchase of a water-jacket furnace which produced a higher purity of copper for a lower price.

In 1885 this purchase was agreed to by the Board however given the low price of copper and the fact that the Directors had not drawn a salary from the mine for two years meant the company was forced to close.

However, later the same Director renamed the company the South Australian Mining and Smelting Company, settled the previous debt with the creditors, employed a new mine manager Mr James and purchased the new Furnace. Transportation costs were still a considerable burden and in the 1888 Mining Journal it was written that until a more secure water source could be found the water-jacket furnace could not be erected.

It was during this period that Captain Doble from Cornwall took over the mines management but the ongoing drought and lack of work force (wages were higher in the Broken Hill Mines) the Board reported that production ceased in June 1888.

The ever optimistic Board however petitioned the SA Government to build a narrow gauge railway from Parachilna to Blinman with the government receiving 5% of the cost of all transported goods. During this time, Mr Massey the company's Managing Director was using the local press to seek support for a local School of Mines and Industry to be established in Blinman. The rail route was surveyed but like Mr Massey's school, never built.

In June 1889 optimistic reports of rich oxide ore and a permanent water supply touted the Blinman area as being as good as Broken Hill, this buoyed the company and a new crusher and two new furnaces to be built by Gawler's May Brothers were ordered.

However following an ongoing legal dispute over wages with the miners, a near fatal accident and the death of Captain Doble in September 1892, the mine was sold in the October of that year to the Blinman Mining Company.

This company worked the mine on tribute and sold off the machinery to the Clara St Dora Company who mined in the Davenport Ranges. Tribute meant that the ore body in the mine was divided into "pitches." The group would then work that pitch for nine weeks. They would usually receive subsistence payments at the end of each month, how much they earned depended not just on how hard they worked but on how well they had judged the value of the pitch - and on luck. They could even end up in debt if their share of the proceeds was less than expenses and subsistence.

By the end of 1903 there were about 50 men and boys employed at the mine and the company was looking for a buyer. Later that year it was sold to the Tasmanian Copper Company. This company had large resources and was experienced in areas where there were difficulties processing ore. The intention was to re equip the mine, build a smelter and encourage other mines in the area by buying their ore as well. Over 30,000 pounds was spent on this upgrade with the new smelter ordered from the James Martin Foundry in Gawler.

The mine continued under the management of Captain Henrie and its success was due more to the high price of copper and exaggerated accounts of the mines production in the local press. At its peak the company owned 36 mining properties which included Blinman, Sliding Rock, Yudanamutana, Cutaway, Lady Falmer, Mount Lyndhurst & Warra Warra (near Maree) and employed over 400 men and had spent over 500,000 pounds in South Australia.

On the sudden death of Captain Henrie in May 1907, the company was thrown into disarray and in the November of that year the mining of ore and the furnace ceased and parts from the dismantled mine were taken to be used in the new Port Pirie smelter. Tributers continued to mine Blinman intermittently but this ceased about 1918 and the chimneys were demolished in the 1930's

#### **Trans Australian Railway Centenary**

#### 17 October 2017

The centenary celebration will be held at 1.45pm on Tuesday 17th October 2017, 4kms west of Ooldea. At this stage 100 people and about 45 vehicles have registered to attend.

#### Travel to Ooldea

Ooldea is approximately 320kms from Ceduna. The turn off from the Eyre Highway to Ooldea is 177kms west of Ceduna. Ooldea is 140kms north of the turn off. The first 78kms from the Eyre Highway to the Iluka mine is bitumen. The remaining 62kms to Ooldea is dirt with some limestone ridges, and is best travelled in a 4WD drive vehicle.

Access to the rail link site is only available on the southern side of the railway line. The land to the north of the Ooldea rail crossing is Aboriginal land owned by Maralinga Tjarutja, and access permits are required.

The 4km stretch south of the railway line and west from Ooldea to the site is very rough and only accessible via 4WD. People travelling in 4WD vehicles – with or without trailers – will be directed to designated parking areas adjacent to the link site. It would be appreciated if you could follow the instructions provided by the event volunteers.

People travelling to Ooldea in conventional vehicles are asked to park their cars in designated areas provided at Ooldea, and then use the shuttle 4WD service provided by volunteers to get to and from the link site.

Some people may prefer to stay overnight near Ooldea, rather than complete the return journey from Ceduna on the same day.

An opportunity exists for people to link the 100th anniversary of the railway line event with a visit to the historic Maralinga Village. Maralinga Village is 50km north of Ooldea and has camping areas for people with caravans and camping trailers. There are no powered sites available, however the village provides ablution facilities with hot showers, laundry, 240 volt power outlets and clothes lines.

For people who are not equipped for camping, there is a limited number of self-contained donga style units available. Accommodation at Maralinga Village must be pre-booked. Don't just turn up on the day and hope to get accommodation. To book camping or donga accommodation, please contact the Maralinga Village Manager on 8670 4089. Tours of the atomic test sites are available at Maralinga, but you will need to book.

#### What is Happening at the Centenary Event?

The event will be held at 1.45pm on the 17th October, the exact time and place that the rails were linked in October 1917. The event will be relatively short and simple. A few short speeches will be made by special guests, invitees and key proponents of the event celebration.

The main activity will comprise the unveiling of monuments (replicas of the originals installed in 1967) which have been constructed in steel by the Australian Rail Track Corporation from the original plans. Photo opportunities with the monuments will be available after the speeches.

#### **Visitor Amenity**

Due to the remote location and complex logistics to supply the site, the infrastructure provision will be kept to a minimum. Portable chemical toilets will be provided.

Attendees should bring their own chairs. The terrain is uneven and the weather can be fickle even in October. Bring sturdy shoes, sun hats, wet weather gear and a wind proof jacket.

#### Refreshments

A user-pays sausage sizzle will also be provided by the Fowler's Bay Progress Association to raise funds for the township development.
