On our travels around the country, we often come across a solitary grave miles from anywhere and wonder at the story behind it or wander through old cemeteries trying to get a glimpse of the lives and hardships people faced on the land. Here is one such story:

Strangways Cemetery

Lonely graves are a part of the history of Australia. Many are unmarked, and names and details are lost forever but every grave is the final resting place of someone's child, spouse, parent or friend. There are five graves as Strangways. Details of only two are known.

Mary and Albert Hewish lived at Strangways. Albert was a linesman on the Overland Telegraph Line and Mary was his pretty blue-eyed wife. Mary was a picture of health but showing the early signs of pregnancy. Mary and Albert had recently spoken to Dr Kennedy as he passed through on the way to Marree.

The following day Albert returned home the early morning after chasing a fault on the telegraph line for most of the night. He was surprised to find Mary still asleep in bed then realised she was unconscious. He threw back the rugs and a huge snake flashed out of the bed and through the door.

Albert instantly realised the seriousness of the situation and rushed across to the Repeater Station to send a message to Marree. "Mary dying. Send Dr Kennedy. Will pay for train. " It was Bill Ferguson's day off but when he heard of Mary's plight he dashed to the station and started lighting the fire in the train's boiler. Almost two hours later the train was underway, the quickest cold start ever. Dr Kennedy kept asking for more speed, but Bill was already travelling at 30 miles an hour on tracks built for a maximum of 20 miles an hour.

As the train neared Coward Springs, it was flagged down by the publican who told them the sad news that Mary had died.

It will never be known just how many men, women and children have died and lie buried in the bush. We know of them only through stories reported at the time. The story above is one found in the archives of an old newspaper. Similar stories can be found in Tales From Bush Graves.

PUBLIC ACCESS ROUTES

There has recently been some discussion on PAR's so the following is by way of explanation. A similar article was printed in the March 2017 edition of the Newsletter.

WHAT IS A PAR?

Public Access Routes (PARs) provide for public access over pastoral land without the need for travellers to ask permission from the pastoral lessee. There are currently 24 Public Access Routes, spanning more than 650 kilometres, established on pastoral leases in South Australia. The consent of the lessee is required before entering a pastoral lease, unless you remain on a public road or a PAR.

In general, PARs are public routes that cross private property to an area of public interest (eg historical sites). Due to the nature of PARs, do not assume they are always accessible

either by 2WD or 4WD. Permission to travel on a PAR is not required per se, but note that PARs can be closed for a variety of reasons (eg stock movement or weather). Assume that pets are not allowed. Allow roads to dry out after rain before traversing them.

CAMPING RULES

The following is a general guide. Please refer to the **pdf** for conditions of use and requirements.

Also <u>www.naturalresources.sa.gov.au/aridlands/news/publications-archive/exploring-the-outback</u> has some brochures on the Oodnadatta, Birdsville and Strzelecki tracks (also available as Apple and Android apps).

Camping is permitted anywhere within 50 metres of the track along all routes except the Copper King Mine route and the Tallaringa Route. On the Copper King route camping is only allowed along the gum creek. No camping is allowed on the Tallaringa PAR while traversing Mabel Creek Station.

On other routes, camping is not permitted within one kilometre of any house or occupied dwelling, or within 500 metres of a constructed stock watering point. Please ensure that only dead wood is used for campfires, and do not use fires during the fire-ban season. *All rubbish is to be taken out, not buried.*

If the PAR terminates at an historic or natural feature of interest, camp only where indicated.

Do not pollute waterways with soap etc. Do not bathe in troughs or tanks. Do not interfere with stock. Carry out your rubbish.

REPORT ON THE CONDITION OF A PAR

PARs are primarily unmaintained 4wd tracks. FWDSA in conjunction with DEW are running an on-going project to assess the condition of all of the PARs. If you are planning on visiting a PAR, please take the time to download the <u>PAR Report Form</u> (MS Word document) from the FWDSA Web Site. Don't worry if others may already have reported; in fact multiple reports on the track condition, signage, etc can only improve the quality of the data. The form provides submission details, but I am happy to pass any information along.



TRIP REPORT

Googs Track August 4th - August 13th

Despite dreadful weather predicted for the next two weeks, seven brave people met at Tarlee on 4 August. Loaded up with tents, swags and sand flags, we left on time and headed to Port Augusta in sunshine but windy weather, then west towards Wudinna, stopping to observe the art work on the Kimba silos and the giant galah. Our first camp was at Pildappa Rock. We climbed this fantastic rock formation and watched a beautiful sunset.

My task each day was to check that all members of our party had taken their meds! At Ceduna, we purchased our permits to camp at Googs and the Gawler Ranges National Park. At the entrance to Googs Track we let our tyres down and two other parties approached us from the park....my thoughts were, 'Well we aren't the only crazy people out camping in this terrible weather.'

The track was pleasant, sandy but not difficult. We came to the memorial of Googs and his son and the money tree

Soon we were setting up camp overlooking Googs Lake, hoping that we could watch a beautiful sunrise the following morning.




Well, we all got it very wrong, because there were showers overnight and cloudy in the morning and the sun didn't get up where we thought it would!!! But everyone was warm and dry. Brent, Colin and I went for a long walk over several sand ridges then back along the lake shore line. We saw a lot of 'roo and emu tracks, dead harvest beetles on the dry lake but nothing else alive. Even the ants were inside their ant mounds with the holes blocked. Bob and Pauline walked to the

island on the lake. Later we all went for a drive around the lake edge, returning to find there had been a very heavy shower of rain that had wet everything under our shelters and we were very surprised to see that the lake had a sheet of water across it.

The following day a group in front of us were having trouble getting over the sand ridges. "It could be a very loooong day" It turns out they had 40 psi in one of their trailer tyres!!!!! I took the opportunity to walk the track until the rest of the group came by to pick me up.

Colin found a bag moth casing, and opened it to reveal shedded caterpillar skins and faeces. Soon after this Colin became 'a little bit complacent" and needed a help to get over the sand ridge!!!! He had been looking at wild flowers! The 2nd snatch by Brent did the trick!!!!!!

The track into the Mt Finke camp was very twistyand turny. Darryll who was leading, thought he was travelling in a circle, thinking he might meet up with the rest of us soon and the top of the ridge was as rough as hessian bag underpants!!



very hot and sweaty! I had worn a beanie every day of the trip and some really cold nights, and spilt a cup of coffee over myself. It was really time I had a shower.....I stunk! I think I could join the Skunk Brother gang!!!!!

Day 5 was a beautiful sunny day. There were lots of wild flowers and challenging sand ridges. Stopped for lunch and put air back into tyres, but unfortunately discovered it was too soon as we encountered lots of corrugations.
