

EDUCATIONAL

EMERGENCY TOWING – WHAT ARE THE RULES?

Last week, when enjoying some driving around the northern Flinders Ranges, we met a group with one vehicle under tow. Of course, in 'remote' areas many things can happen. In this case, we suspect the unfortunate vehicle had punctured the sump as we found lots of engine oil on the track. Round the campfire that night, the discussion turned to the rules for towing disabled vehicles. We all had an opinion as to rules but none knew for certain. In the following, I will try to provide some educated interpretation on the real rules.

DISCLAIMER: (we all need one these days). The following is a layman's interpretation of the relevant legislation and regulations. If in doubt you should consult with a relevant authority.

As with all of the legislation and regulations governing everything we do associated with driving on public roads we are faced with a myriad of differing legislation and regulations. The logical starting point would be the Australian Road Rules (see https://infrastructure.gov.au/roads/legislation/road_rules.aspx) but very quickly we are directed to the various State authorities. For the purposes of this article, we'll concentrate on the South Australian interpretation.

Actually, by only using one State's set of information the answer to the topic of this article becomes reasonably straight forward. I'll now try to answer the campfire questions (the references are listed under the questions):

Q1: Can I use a tow rope or must I use a rigid connection between vehicles?

A1: Short answer, tow rope is OK

However, (from Ref 1):

If using a towline of any sort, your vehicle must not be more than 4 metres from the vehicle being towed (motorcycles 2.5 metres). If the towline is longer than 2 metres, it must have a white or brightly-coloured piece of cloth attached in the middle to act as a warning signal to other road users.

Q2: Can I carry passengers in the towed vehicle?

A2: Don't know the answer - the legislation and regulations seem to be silent on this matter. Of course, for a non-rigid tow, the towed vehicle must have a driver who can steer and provide effective braking. Personally, I believe that all passengers should be moved to other vehicles (airbags, seat belt pre-tensioners and a myriad of other safety device may not work properly if the engine is not running).

This brings me to a couple of other points (which may not have been covered in the campfire discussion):

Q3: What about lights?

A3: While lights during daylight are always a good idea (I never turn mine off!), at night lighting is critical. If the disabled vehicle can use their own lights, including turn signals, great. However, if you must tow at night and towed vehicle lights are not an option, then you should be using a light board controlled by the towing vehicle. (I carry lots of spares, but this is certainly not one of them - guess we better camp until the sun comes up.)

Q4: What about towing capacity?

A4: This is probably not a real issue. However, you should consider the potential significant loads that will be experienced when towing over typical 4WD roads. Sure, my cute little SUV might easily pull that thumping great big Toyota / Nissan along a nice flat road, but once hills and other obstacles come into play, the potential to damage smaller vehicles increases. Guess this is one of those times when you need to look for a better solutions;

buy good recovery insurance and send the little guy off to call "1800 Get Me Home".

TRIP REPORT

SERVICETOWN- A HIDDEN RAILWAY STATION

You may have never been to Serviceton, although you may well have passed it many times. Serviceton is in Victoria just near the South Australian/Victoria border just south of Bordertown and a few kilometres off the main highway. Its claim to fame is its elegant and substantial brick Railway Station built in 1889. On a recent trip to Canberra we were returning via Bordertown and saw the sign "Historic Railway Station" off the main highway just over the border. We turned around and drove the few kilometres to the small town of Serviceton. The large imposing Railway Station greeted us and we were totally amazed.

Serviceton was established after the Victorian and South Australian governments decided to build a junction station midway between their capitals when the broad gauge was completed in 1886.

The Premier of South Australia, John Downer, wrote to his Victorian equivalent, James Service, suggesting that the new border railway town and station be named Downer after him. Service wrote back and said that as it was in Victoria, it would be named Serviceton after himself. The township was to house and cater for railway employees to enable them to work within their own states. The new township was well equipped with businesses in the early years including general store, bakery, butcher, blacksmith, boarding houses, stables, temperance hotel, coffee palace and wine bar. The tender to build the station was accepted in 1887 at the cost of 8,449 Pounds, 9 Shillings. The cost of this classified three level building was to be equally shared by Victoria and South Australia. It is constructed of Horsham made bricks on the then "disputed territory" and completed in 1889. Following the surveying of the border it was discovered that there was a discrepancy of up to approximately two kilometres and the dispute was finally settled in Victoria's favour. Thus the station now sits in Victoria.

The imposing brick station has 15 main rooms (at Platform level) including large Refreshment Room and three levels - basement. platform level and attic. Prior to Federation in 1901, this was also the Customs Office and a fee had to be paid for all goods brought from South Australia Victoria. This would have been quite an ordeal for settlers moving eastward with all their belongings



to pay this charge. As Serviceton was the border post, train crews and engines were changed between the South Australian Railways and Victorian Railways. Passengers had to go to the "South Australian" ticket office to buy tickets coming to South Australia, or if they were going to Victoria and changing trains had to go to the "Victorian" ticket office next door!

Trains were changed here right up to the 1980's and the Refreshments Room was closed in 1981 and the complete station closed in 1986.



The Refreshment Room has very high walls and windows (which were painted out in the war years) and is 52 feet (15.85m) long. This room was used by all passenger trains up to the 1950's to allow passengers refreshments at all hours, day or night. The Overland used to stop at Serviceton. Buffet cars were gradually introduced on trains which lessened the need for such Refreshment Rooms. The basement area is as large as the upper platform area and was used mainly for storage. It also contains a dungeon or prison area. This was mainly used in the war years

for prisoners of war en route to or from the upper south east district of South Australia.

The large station yard was quite extensive, as all locomotives were changed here so that they only operated in their own states. There were four sets of tracks as well as service lines to the locomotive sheds and workshops (for both states), coal stages and a manually operated turntable. There was also a goods shed and signal box which had clocks for both states time.

On 7 September 1951, the westbound Overland service collided with its eastbound equivalent at the station with four A2 class locomotives destroyed and one fatality.

Since the station was closed by V/Line it is now operated by a committee of management from the local community and is open some week-ends and by appointment. (Contact 03 5393 1228 or 03 5393 1448)


UPALINNA STATION FLINDERS RANGES OCTOBER LONG WEEKEND 2018

Thursday 27 September

We packed up the last minute things into the car stopped off and visited Matthew, Jesinta and Pippa before heading off. Traffic was pretty good. We stopped at Clare for some morning tea. Refuelled at Hawker before stopping in at Upalinna station, which is 9 kms from Wilpena. We paid our fees staying 5 nights at 15 dollars a night per vehicle. We had to go back out onto highway and head toward Blinman and turn off into camping area 100 metres up the road. We were given sites 3 and 4. We picked a relatively flat spot and started to set up. We were just putting up an awning when a red Nissan turned up and parked in site 4. We weren't expecting anyone else today so was working out how to let them know they were in wrong site. Thankfully Bronte and Norma got out of their vehicle. They unloaded a large load of wood before setting up. A lovely dinner and campfire before having a early night.

The art exhibition was held in the old shearing shed and entry was a gold coin donation, there was some great art work but all the ones that we liked were already sold. Then we had a walk around old Wilpena station. Went onto Stokes Hill lookout; it was rather overcast and very windy. Back to camp for lunch and sat around the campfire. Peter, Sandra and Martin arrived about 4 pm. Max, Lyn, Brenton, Keryn and Wil arrived after dark. Martin also arrived with plenty



of wood. Another cold and windy night spent around the campfire.

Saturday 29 September

Up early as couldn't sleep; Bronte was already up and had the fire going. He had been up



since 2 o'clock. Had breakfast and got ready for our drive, packed a thermos and some afternoon tea. At 10 o'clock we all headed towards Blinman. First stop was Wall of China and then Stokes Hill lookout. It was a lot clearer sky today but still very windy and cold which gave us a much better view of the ranges. Lunch at the Blinman Hotel before having a look at the Blinman art exhibition. From there we drove out to Artimore ruins on the public access route. A great drive taking in some

Sunday 30th September

Then into the office/souvenir shop to get our passes for the drive through the park. There were plenty of people around. We went into Sacred Canyon. After morning tea we went for a walk

up the canyon where there were plenty of aboriginal carvings to look at. From there it was on to Bunyeroo Gorge where we stopped for lunch. There seemed to be a little more traffic on the road than yesterday. I don't think you get ever get over how beautiful the Flinders Ranges are and it would have to be one of my favourites spots in our beautiful country. We made our way on to Brachina Gorge and there were plenty of kangaroos around and even spotted a couple of yellow footed rock wallabies.



Back to camp and had roast beef and

vegies for tea before enjoying the company of everyone around the campfire. Later that evening we heard a loud noise that we thought might have been thunder but got really loud and continued. It was followed by the ground trembling. Poor Norma was in the long drop at the time. When she got out walked around to check no one was rattling on it. Max and Lyn were also packing up. After breakfast we headed off with Peter and Sandra while everyone stayed back at camp for a day of relaxation. Stopped off at the Blinman bakery for some treats mainly for the Quondong pies then stopped in Glasses Gorge for some morning tea before making our way to Nuccaleena Mine. On our way into the mine 3 vehicles were coming out, one was being towed. Further on we found an oil trail followed by a puddle of oil - we assumed they were on their way in and had to turn around. Then another group of 4 were coming out. We had a look around the mine site before finding a lunch spot in a creek on our way out. Back to camp via Moolooloo, Patawarta and Artimore ruins. from the art exhibition. We had another great day. We enjoyed some apple and pear crumble and ice cream around the campfire before going to bed.

Went into Hawker for lunch and ran into Bronte and Norma. A bearing had gone in their trailer and Peter had helped him fix it. Wasn't anything around for lunch so we went on to Cradock and had a counter meal of beef schnitzels then homeward bound. Got home around 4.30pm and unpacked.

Friday 28 September 2018

In our brand new Mazda BT 50 Ute towing our camp trailer we arrived with welcoming smiles, cup of tea and camp fire ready for a great weekend.




