



EDUCATIONAL

Following on from previous articles in the Newsletter about Caravans, you might be interested in the following which I found in the latest edition of Westprint Friday Five.

Caravan Jacks

Technical article from the Caravan Council of Australia.

There are far too many nasty accidents caused when jacks are used to change wheels / tyres on caravans and camper-trailers. There have been reports of some jacks having their lifting mechanism unexpectedly fail... causing the jack to instantly collapse.

The main causes of jacking accidents are clearly the jack:

- (a) Not being completely suitable for the particular caravan, and
- (b) Not having its top positively located so as to prevent it sliding in any horizontal direction.

It is essential that a caravan jack is appropriately approved, and has a sufficient Load Rating, along with a sufficient Travel (lifting range).

Caravan Jacks must.

- Be Approved to the Australian Standard
- Have the top positively located by a mating locating recess to prevent any horizontal slippage
- Be operational for when the caravan is both empty, and fully-loaded
- Be positioned on a firm base
- Have a sufficient Load Rating
- Have a sufficient length of *Travel*

A Caravan Jack *must*.


- When on a firm base, be *low* enough to engage a *locating recess*, when *any* tyre is *fully-deflated*
- Have sufficient travel, to enable a fully-inflated tyre to replace that tyre

Allowance must be made for the suspension "*droop*" when the caravan is raised.

Allowance must be made for the probability that the tyres(s) on one side of the caravan will be loaded greater than on the other side. *Typically*, this *may* be around 10%.

A *conservative* assumption must be made on the *actual* Ball-Loading. It is of course much more preferable to have had the Ball-Loading *measured*, for the particular loading of the caravan.


While a *typical* caravan may have a Ball-Loading of around 10% of the *actual* mass of the loaded caravan, the *actual* Ball-Loading *may* only be around 5%.




The relationship between a jack's **Load** (lifting force) and its **Travel**, is a basic physics topic of **Moments**... which is Force X Distance.

With the Ball as the pivot, it is a "balance" or a "compromise" – for any given effective Load (M) times its Distance (LM) from the pivot – and the jack's available Force (J) times its Distance (LJ) from the pivot.

The jack's available **Travel** (Extended Length minus Retracted Length) must be sufficient to enable a tyre to be safely replaced. $M \times LM = J \times LJ$



The *greater* the **LJ** Distance, the *lesser* the **J** Force can be... and vice-versa.



Caution:

Never rely on a jack... **tragic** accidents have occurred when a jack has **failed** or has **slipped**.

It is most important to **practise** changing a wheel/ tyre **before** heading off on a trip, so that you know *exactly* what to do if you have the misfortune to have a punctured tyre on your travels.

- Do you know where *everything* you will need, is stored... and how to *use* everything?
- Does the Wheel-Brace fit the wheel-nuts, and do you have the strength to loosen tightened nuts?
- Does the top of the jack correctly suit the jacking points on the underside of the chassis rails?
- Does the jack have sufficient *lifting capacity* (Load Rating)?
- Does the jack have sufficient *travel*... and is the *minimum height* low enough?

Always carefully read the *Warning Notice* and *Operating Instructions* supplied with the jack.

If something is *not* clear to you, contact the Manufacturer for clarification.

Typical (Conservative) Example:

"All-Up Mass" of caravan: 2,000 kg

Ball-Loading: 100 kg (5% of All-Up Mass)

Therefore, effective Load = 1,900 kg

Heavier side of caravan M: 1,000 kg

Lighter side of caravan: 900 kg

LM = 2.00 m


Therefore, $M \times LM = 2,000 \text{ kg.m}$

Therefore, J x LJ must equal (or exceed) 2,000 kg.m

If LJ is 3.0 m, J must exceed 667 kg

If LJ is 4.0 m, J must exceed 500 kg

Typical Locating Device... Positively locates the top of the Jack, to prevent it slipping in any horizontal direction.



GENERAL INFORMATION – CAMPSITE SECURITY

We all go camping and tend to leave our campsites exposed to come back to later on. I found this article on Snowys' website about camp safety and thought it timely to add to the Newsletter as holidays are coming up and we can all be very trusting when leaving our belongings around our campsites..



Campsite Security - Don't Get Robbed When Camping

'She'll be right. Modern vehicles are fitted with immobilisers. Nobody will take it.'

I don't know about you but the only thing we have had stolen from our campsite is an icebox. How un-Australian! And, we generally leave everything behind when we take off and explore. Chairs, BBQ, gas bottle, and other bits and pieces. Then there's the car. In its glory with GPS, car fridge, and other camping goodies on full display. It may be locked, but did we take the keys with us?

Here are a few things to consider for security sake when you're out camping:

Is your vehicle really secure?

Apparently, new age thieves don't like breaking glass or hot wiring ignitions - what has become of them? Now they like picking the low hanging fruit - cars with keys in the ignition. Or they'll break into your house, tent or caravan first - easier to do than most cars, and look for the keys neatly hanging on that hook by the door.

They look for unattended cars at shops, parked waiting for their owners at car washes, in workshop yards, or when the owner has 'just popped in' to grab something. They swoop and they're done in a flash.

Here's a fact for you: in some Australian states it is illegal to leave your car unlocked, the window open, or the keys in the ignition if you're more than a certain distance away.

Three metres in NSW!



Securing the campsite

When we're camping, we're not going to stop leaving gear behind. It's too inconvenient for the perceived risk. But we have started taking precautions. One of the reasons is that our insurance provider requires us to - they're not going to pay out a claim if we've breached the policy.

We put a few lengths of chain around our solar panels and Weber and connect them to our caravan's drawbar. Generally, if we have a campsite to ourselves, we'll throw the good chairs and icebox into the 4×4 or caravan, but if other campers are around we'll check to see if they're sticking around and ask them to keep an eye on our things. Of course, we'll do the same in return if they go off to explore.

Handy tips for keeping your campsite secure:

1. Don't put your home address or car rego on your key ring or your caravan

Use your phone number instead. If you put your rego number on your key ring, a would-be crim' knows exactly what car to pinch. Your phone number is a much safer option and is far more practical for the swift return of your keys.

2. Big locks act as a deterrent

An amateur thief wants to be in and out as quickly as possible and often don't carry things like angle grinders (can you imagine that?) or bolt cutters.

3. Get to know your fellow campers

If you get to know your fellow campers, you can see if they'll keep an eye over your camp and return the favour. Still be wary of blindly trusting strangers though, and take the necessary precautions to lock up and secure your gear.

4. Check your insurance policy

Double check with your insurance provider to see what it does and does not cover before you head off, so you know what to be extra cautious with.

5. Keep valuables out of sight

Don't leave phones, tablets, computers, and cameras on display. If you have to leave them behind, stash them under a seat, mattress, or somewhere that a would-be thief is unlikely to look.

6. Keep your trip off social media

Be careful with what you post on social media. 'We're off to Darwin for a week!' says 'Our home will be empty, go rob us' to would-be-crims.

The casual Aussie, 'she'll be right', attitude is what Australia is so well known for. However, unpatriotic low-lives set out to exploit this attitude. Don't let them get the upper hand. Be cautious. Secure your gear.

TRIP REPORT

Ngaut Ngaut Trip Report

After an early start, we left the train park at Nuriootpa on a beautiful but fresh morning, led by Q and Deb. We were heading for Swan Reach via Angaston, Keyneton and Sedan. Although hazy, the views of old stone ruins, some mud and daub and dry stone walls along the way were delightful.

We passed over SA's 1865 oldest, still working stone arch bridge at Angaston and learnt that Swan Reach's Hotel, built in 1899, was originally the homestead. After morning tea at Len White Reserve, Roger and Blake, Bronte and Norma, Q and Deb, John, Jane and Sandra H, Keryn and Brent met Ivy, our Aboriginal Guide at Nildottie.

We travelled further on to the Aboriginal Sacred site Ngaut Ngaut to meet more members of Ivy's family.

This was SA's 1st Archaeological dig. About 29 years ago a board walk was built and a few ambitious people ventured up the 218 steps with guide, Sam, to the cliff top. Although chatty at the base, the climb was done mostly in silence, except loud sounds of puffing......presumably in awe of the fantastic views!!!!

Sam showed us the midden area. Mens' and womens' meeting places for special occasions, evidence of past fires and collections of particles of stone, (some traded by tribes from different areas) shells and bone used by previous occupants of this land. We were also shown several varieties of bush tucker growing in the area.





As we made our way along the base of the cliff we saw Aboriginal Art, scattered along the walls. explained their significance as maps of the area - where river crossings could be found, distances to water and holes sources plentiful food. It could be related to our version of a food menu or road map.

There have been 11 generations of people frequenting this site since white settlement and the tribe consisted of about 60



It was good of them to share their special place with us and the importance of its preservation into the future.



As we left the Ngaut Ngaut reserve, Norma announced there was a 'big stink' and a squeal in their vehicle!!! No, it wasn't either of occupants, but once the bonnet was opened it was obvious that something had collapsed/seized and the long belt was melted and chewed!!! Sadly they had to wait for a truck and missed out on the trip to the motor museum in Swan Reach.

The rest of the group visited

the museum with its collection of 13 vehicles. Blake picked out his favourite and others talked about what they had owned in the past or what they would like to own!! Apart from the cars, I loved the floor surface!!

As the sun was getting lower, we stopped at Nildottie for an ice cream and checked in on the Rivetts. The truck was on its way, so the least we could do was leave them with an ice cream as we wandered home. They insisted they had everything they needed including food, water and even their stretchers in the back if needed!!!!

We waved them a goodbye and reflected on a fantastic day soured by the unfortunate breakdown of our friend's vehicle.
