

TRIP PLANNING - PLANNING AN EXTENDED TRIP - PART 3

Last month, I discussed some of the big picture items to thinks about when planning an extended trip to somewhere like the Kimberly region. Although this trip would certainly include "remote" area travel, most of the chosen route would be along well travelled roads. Even so, critical elements to consider would be water, fuel and communications.

Water Consumption

Water is critical to survival in just about all conditions. So, just how much water do I need to carry? There are many variables to consider, such as

- Average daily temperatures (you will need more water in warmer weather);
- Level of physical activity planned more activity → more water
- · Availability of water to replenish stocks

For travel in warmer months, you should allow about 5 litres of water per person per day. For our example trip provided last month, the longest time between water availability is about 6 days. It also makes sense to include emergency rations of, say 3 litres per person for a 5 day period. The table below is the recommended minimum water requirements for remote travel:

Number of People	1	2	3	4	5
Normal (5 days)	25	50	75	100	125
Emergency (5 days)	15	30	45	60	75
Total	40	80	120	160	200

Hmmm, the table above highlights another problem. Imagine a vehicle carrying 4 people on a remote trip Apart from all of the fuel and food and other items we might need, we are now planning on adding 160 litres of water. Water is heavy and 160l will add 160 kg to your total vehicle load plus the weight of Jerry cans to hold the water.

Yes, you will face a dilemma with most vehicles if you plan to carry everything for 4 people on a single vehicle. Can I cut back on water? Sure, but remember that most people who become stranded in remote areas do not perish from starvation but dehydration.

For our Kimberly trip, the numbers and table above are probably very conservative. I now know that the longest we went without being able to get potable water was 3 days and, even if we got stuck, that trip would probably only require a couple of days of emergency water.

This is where the detailed planning comes in. Try to research all of the available literature well ahead of making the trip and use this information to refine what is, and is not required.

Communications

While our in-car and portable UHF radios provide excellent two-way communications between vehicles in the same group, the maximum range of these devices is limited to well less than 20km (in some case 5km might not even work). While the coverage of mobile phones is increasing, they still only cover major centres and main highways.

To be able to contact the "outside world" we need a means of long range communications. Today, there are only two methods of long range communications readily available to the average traveller, and these are:

- HF Radio, and
- Satellite Phone

Both systems have advantages and disadvantages. While not exhaustive, here is a comparison for the relative merits of each system

Characteristic	HF Radio	Satellite Phone
Range	Worldwide (depends on a number of factors)	Worldwide
Availability	Depends on atmospheric conditions	Must be able to "see" satellite
Private	No: means that a request for assistance might be heard by others in vicinity	Yes: point to point communications - someone needs to answer phone
Equipment Cost	Equipment for both systems can eitle rented. Good used equipment is ofto	•
Operating Costs	Operating licence required. Usually obtained from membership of organisations such as VK5737. Annual fee less than \$150 Zero operating costs	Many plans available eg Iridium. Usually pay-by-the-minute, ~\$3
Ease of Use	There are lots of options with HF so, perhaps, ease of use can be more complicated	If you can use a mobile phone you can probably use a SatPhone; just need to know the number to call (000 might not be available so you will need to know the alternate)
Portability	Usually fixed install in vehicle. Probably difficult to remove in emergency and they would need a power source	Grab and run as the car heads into the ravine would be a good option

In summary, while many might have "Holden vs Ford" polarised views, both systems offer advantages over the alternate. Personally, I have opted to use HF. If I had another \$2k spare I might also buy a SatPhone.

Elsewhere in this issue of our Newsletter you will find an article reproduced from Westprint on one HF radio system and associated Personal Locator Beacon (PLB).

Fuel

It is probably fair to say that after water, fuel is the next most critical consideration. Calculating fuel requirements is reasonably straight forward. We probably all know how much fuel our vehicle uses when driving around town and on the open road.

However, once we head off on that great adventure, fuel consumption will increase significantly due to a number of factors, including:

- Increase vehicle load
- Roof rack wind resistance
- Trailer
- Off road tyres
- Road surface

It is not unreasonable to assume that fuel consumption could double.

Planning re-fuel options is essential. Sure, all types of fuel are usually readily available in all of the major centres. But, as travel becomes more remote, so does the availability. In some remote communities, petrol is not available at all. Back to the planning - make sure you identify which communities / roadhouses / etc are still operating and that they carry the fuels required for each vehicle. Of course, there is no guarantee that the fuels will actually be available on the day you arrive - we have seen a queue the whole length of town waiting for a delayed tanker to arrive. That reminds me: plan for contingencies.

One piece of advice for you to consider is to always top-up with fuel (and other commodities) at every opportunity.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Car Torque

The current model Landcruiser series 200 was released in 2007, so many people are eager for the new model 300 series due in a year or two.

The new series 300 is rumored to have a petrol turbo V6 and a turbo diesel V6 as the new motor range with a Hybrid due later in its model life. Australia and the Middle East are two of the larger market for Landcruiser with 13,677 sold in Australia in 2018. Keep an eye out for the Tokyo Car Show in October this year for a possible glimpse of the new 300 series.

The VW Amarok was released in 2010 and a new model is under development. What makes this development interesting is the new model Amarok (due in a couple of years) will be developed as a "brother" to the new model Ford Ranger. Ford Australia is involved in the development of the new Ranger and it is believed to share the main chassis and possible drive trains with the new VW. In a deal similar to the current Mazda BT50, the new VW Amarok will have more than just new lights and bumpers to distinguish it apart from the new Ranger.

Speaking of the Mazda BT50, the new 2020 model will be based on the third generation Isuzu D-Max.

You might find this article interesting especially when travelling in the outback and should you wish to follow it up, contact details are listed at the end of the article..

Westprint Friday Forum

Austravel Safety Net (HF radio network) has recently launched two more products that integrate with the existing Austravel HF radio network and its emergency call system.

H.E.L.P. (4357) is Austravel's mainstay emergency call system, operated from a single press of the "red button" found on HF radios. Yes, what used to be the RFDS emergency call button, which became obsolete a few years back, can now be utilised again when you need help in a hurry. Austravel members tell us that they find the "red button" emergency call system reassuring as their travelling companions can be educated very quickly on how to summon help and assistance, given the normal HF radio operator maybe incapacitated and unable to manage an emergency call themselves.

Unlike the old RFDS red button, Austravel's red button is not restricted to medical emergency situations only.

Additional to Austrave's H.E.L.P. (4357) emergency call system come new additions...."HELP-*PLB*" and "HELP-*SAT*".

HELP-*PLB* integrates any Austravel members registered Personal Locator Beacon into the Austravel HF radio network, where both a HF radio and a PLB activation can come together for the Australian Maritime Safety Authority (AMSA) in times of need.

AMSA would always prefer voice communications when a PLB is activated to validate the emergency and respond quicker by knowing what search and rescue assets they need to deploy. Austravel members with a HF radio interfaced with GPS capabilities (over 50% of Austravel members HF radios are GPS active), place themselves in a better situation in times of need than a PLB only.

Lastly, Austravel also announces the introduction of "HELP-SAT".

Some outback travellers use a HF radio and a Sat-phone, some Sat-Phone only. Whatever the case and without getting into a debate about the virtues of a HF radio versus Sat-Phone (and vice versa); Austravel understand that a sat-phone user may need specific information and /or service, but don't carry with them the contact details they need. Like any phone, they only work if you know the number to call.

Experienced Austravel incident responders can manage a sat-phone call and assist the Austravel member to get connected, regardless of the need or urgency.


HELP-*PLB* is a complimentary service available to "full members" whereas HELP-*SAT* is complimentary to full members with a HF radio, but social membership (\$30/year) is the minimum member category for non-HF radio users. In summary, three emergency call systems/platforms, one HF radio network with a team of incident responders across Australia.
