

GENERAL INFORMATION

Thanks to Quenton for the following article.

CAR TORQUE

Ford Australia introduced a 4x4 Ute based on the XY Falcon model in 1972. The XY model was introduced in 1970 and because of testing and manufacturing delays of the 4WD version the XY 4WD Ute was not released until 1972.

Due to new ADR rules introduced in 1972, the 4WD XY was fitted with such things as a high back bench seat (the only XY model to have high back headrests) and a collapsible steering column as fitted to the new 1972 XA Falcon model. Leaf springs front and rear and a

reinforced cab was needed to suit the outback demands envisaged for this new workhorse

The engine fitted was a six cylinder petrol 250 cubic inch with a three speed floor mounted shift with two speed transfer case. Due to a tight storage area of the spare tyre, only 6.00×16 lug tread skinny cross-ply tyres could be fitted. 432 of these Utes were made in Brisbane with many sold in Queensland and NSW. New price was \$3,680 (compared to \$2,383 for a standard 250 XY Ute.)

As kids we used to visit a outback station near Lightning Ridge and they bought one of these Utes brand new and it was the owners main runabout - it proved very capable on wet and highly rutted roads and station tracks. A member of the Gawler Car Club has restored one of these Utes, so you may see a light grey one around Gawler from time to time.

Ford went on to release the "Outback" Falcon Ute in the 1990's - a high riding 2WD with limited slip diff and in 2003 the "RTV" Falcon Ute with high ground clearance and a locking rear diff, but a 4WD version was never made again.



HOW TO STORE BREAD:

Someone put this question to Westprint Friday Five readers and following are some of the responses received. (I haven't tried them myself so cannot verify whether they work or not.) Have you got any other ideas to share? I have a problem storing carrots, they don't seem to last well at all – any ideas????

- I've stored supermarket loaves for 10 days, airtight in the following container. Brand: Lock and Lock. Volume: 3.4L/115oz/3.6qt, Name: HANACOL Made in China. Takes a full loaf with a little compression but surprisingly bread lasts. Have had 'Tip Top' supermarket bread last 10 days. Les
- In a recipe book written by Ron Moon he says to wrap it in paper and then foil and keep it in a cool place. We have done this on a number of trips and it does keep bread

fresh, we can get up to 7 days depending on temperature. We find Mighty Soft or Tip Top bread lasts the best. Paul

- One of the most important thing is NOT TO TOUCH the bread with the hands, only with a towel or paper. Hands have a lot of yeast cultures on them and by touching the bread these are then transferred to the bread and generate mould. One other thing is to keep it in a towel or paper towel and then in a zip-lock plastic bag / airtight container. The towel will absorb the humidity and keep it fresh. If bread is just stored in plastic bags the humidity generates water droplets along the plastic which will generate mould in those spots. So, wash your hands, then get the bread out of the bag in the towel, only touch the outside of the towel to handle bread, then store it again and seal the bag tight. That will prolong the life of the bread for quite a bit. Also keep the bread in a cool(er), dark location. As I only have a small fridge I keep it in the clothes cabinet, nicely wrapped in some jumpers. This keeps the temperature constant which helps to reduce humidity in the bag. Susi
- BTW: The same applies for cheese never touch with the bare hands or your "fingerprints" will grow on it!
- I think the attached article below for Keeping Bread Fresh for Travel might have been what Gordon was referring to. Although I have never tested the suggested method, I did go to the trouble of keeping a copy of the article just in case! Roger

KEEPING BREAD FOR TRAVEL:

- Purchase fresh supermarket bread wholemeal seems to keep better than white bread.
- Extract as much air from the bag as is possible without causing the bag to collapse the bread. This can be easily achieved by placing a small piece of air tubing (say 15 cm long) partially into the bag and then close the bag neck tight with your fingers as you draw out the air. Pull out the tubing and reseal the bag quickly.
- Resealing can be done with the usual bag clip or for a tighter seal you can use a piece
 of sticky tape applied tightly around the neck where the clip would normally be.
- Totally cover the plastic bag (including the ends) in aluminium foil, seal with tape and then wrap in several sheets of newspaper, again sealing the ends just as you would for a parcel.
- Place in a cool place (eg cupboard or inside of the camper)
- Bread packaged this way is said to keep for 2 weeks my test packet was fine at 10 days although I noticed that it began to go stale around 2 days after opening. If you are not a big consumer of bread then it might be worth saving your old bread bags and repackaging a loaf into two half loaves?
- Bread does not need to be refrigerated or frozen.

WHAT DO YOU LOOK FOR WHEN YOU TRAVEL?

The following is one couple's observations. Maybe you agree with them, maybe you don't. We're always happy to expand on a theme so if you have any observations of your own which aren't listed below, don't be shy, share them with us.

Scenery. Even when it looks like all the same, it's always changing. While driving there's not even time to check the map in case you miss something - different grasses, shrubs, trees, hills, ranges, a fenceline, a dead ?, wedgies, 'roos, emus, camels, horses, of course different breeds and condition of cattle and sheep, when was the last time that creek flowed... all can lead to sensory overload. Discussion on seasonal conditions, different brands of windmills, different types of fences, yards.... how can people say any of it is boring? None of it, ever.

History. We love wandering around old mining towns. Also cemeteries often have lots of information. So much to ponder. Imagining what it was like to live there 100 years ago - water, housing, travel, climatic conditions. Realising how soft we all are these days.

The old buildings. Especially in the WA inland and abandoned mining towns. How they built sometimes lovely structures, all to be left crumbling now.

Meeting people. We try and camp somewhere on our own, but if we can't, someone will always wander by and end up with a cup of tea and conversation. We often learn their stories, of where they live, where they're going, what they've seen......

We always shop in the tiny towns for food, fuel, op shops, visit the info centres, maybe tea at the pub, where we might meet a local for a chat.

'Stop a cocky'. One year in the Rockhampton area we passed paddocks with rows of shrubs. Had no idea, so after a while of guessing, Graham said 'I'll stop a cocky'. We finally found one at a paddock gate, stopped and found it was leucaena, which led to questions, and more research when we came home.

Looking for a camp spot. Not often have we had a crook one, or driven further along the road the next morning and found a better one. We live very basically, no frills, no you-beaut gear, and take pride in that. It makes you realise that you don't need 'stuff', both on the road and living at home. And, of course, 'nature's TV' at night. I have a 'relax indicator'. It could take a few days, but when Graham comments about 'what's for tea' I know we've reached it. He couldn't care less at home.

The job of finding books and information both before we leave, while we're away, and then when we get back. We keep a journal, which always has more questions to find answers to when we get home, than what we had before we left on the trip.

Someone told us years ago that it's harder to go away than to stay home. So many things to organise for leaving - bills to be paid, stock sorted and someone to feed and check them, water tanks and pumps sorted, notes for all our neighbours who help.....

And when we drive out the gate we pledge to leave it all behind - except for the phone call from an hour up the road for someone to check that I've turned off the gas and locked the back door!

Last year we had a short trip up the dirt roads from Broken Hill, zig-zagging as far as Thargomindah (lots to see and do there), and back. We found an abandoned town, had a wander, a ponder, and found out later the last person left only 15 years ago! The drought was truly awful. We couldn't help, but now we've promised ourselves to go back again to see the country after rain.


So, I guess we're a mixture of all you Westprint mob, and what you look for when travelling. Graeme and Leanne.
