





TRIP REPORTS

Maralinga 2019 (No 3)

Maralinga Trip Report, by Annette Wheaton of the Wagga 4WD Club

We began the trip by ambling through the small towns on the way to Tarlee, our meeting point with the Gawler 4WD club.

Upon arrival in Tarlee, we booked into my favourite motel in Australia, The Tarlee Motel. Andy and Margret, the owners of the Tarlee Motel, had lived in Woomera and in Andy's previous life he had been a security guard at Maralinga. They are both fascinating people, and it is a wonderful place to stay.

After settling in, we were invited to the Tarlee local community fund raising BBQ and bonfire on the Tarlee oval. The fire was raging, the snags delicious and a great night was had by all.

The next day we met up with the Gawler four-wheel drive club and the second stage of our adventure began. We were given a copy of an audio book by Judy Nunn called Maralinga; although primarily a love story, this audio book had a great deal of facts about Maralinga.

The first day's mission was to get to Pildappa Rock where we were to set up camp for the night. Along the way there were a few stop offs; silo art at Wirrabara was up first. We also had a look around Iron Knob and although it is now just a shadow of its former self, I was fascinated by this mine, the size and purpose. There was also good example of Dunny art at the rest stop as a bonus. Upon arriving in Kimba, I found out that it is the half way point from the east coast to the west coast of Australia. I



had been driving for what felt like weeks, and I am only half way across Australia! After



Kimba we turned onto a well maintained dirt road that led us to Pildappa rock; a large granite outcrop, much like Wave rock in WA, only smaller. Pildappa Rock was breath taking, well worth a visit.

We packed up our gear in the morning, a little wet from the dew and light rain and headed on. After a brief lunch stop in Ceduna, as well as some supply gathering, we continued on to Penong. We stayed at Penong Caravan Park, in order to refresh as well as to make the early start in the morning a little easier.

Penong has a large display of windmills, both

historic and modern, used in the local area. The windmills have been donated by various members of the community and the collection even sports the largest functioning Comet windmill in Australia!

Onto the Main event of the trip: MARALINGA!

Maralinga is Aboriginal land owned by the Maralinga Tjarutja People. What a place! If you want to learn of the widely untold history of Australia this is a great place to start. The experience is well worth the money. Robyn Matthews was our tour guide and I have never come across a person that has his amount of knowledge and passion for a series of events. He managed to convey the three different versions of events; Australian government, Aboriginal and the British, without any bias, just facts. This is my strong recommendation of a must do trip.

Things you learn:

Maralinga has the biggest air strip in the southern hemisphere; a 2.7km bitumen strip with offshoots either end, that is maintained as an emergency landing strip for planes and, if needed, a backup landing strip for the US space shuttle. The selection of the strip for the backup space shuttle landing was largely due to the parts of the runway either end which sported $30m \times 80m$ patch of 5m deep cement! The strip is around 70 years old and looks like new, as when the Brits arrived, they built everything to last the years they were expecting to stay as well as the changes in aircraft sizes that were bound to happen. They don't build them like that anymore.

The water collection infrastructure is fascinating; when it rains, the runoff from the parking area at the airport is funnelled into a holding dam. The runoff from an inch of rain on the airstrip could possibly keep Maralinga in water for up to 5 years.

The tour took us to several ground zero points, and to the 6 other atomic bomb testing sights. At the Breakaway ground zero, we were able to see where the dirt had been turned to glass, as a result of the heat of the explosion. It was originally one giant sheet of glass, but over time it has broken up into smaller green shards. The green of the glass is caused by the copper present in the soil. The tour also showed us where they buried all the radioactively contaminated equipment- including all vehicles, machinery and buildings in large pits. There are still areas at Maralinga that you cannot go as these areas have high radioactivity and will be off limits for at least 25,000 years. Yes, 25,000 years.

Leaving Maralinga, we went across to Watson which was the fettler's village outside Maralinga. We checked out the old quarry and were amazed by the number of fossils. We continued on, over the Nullarbor Plain to the old Eyre Highway where we set up camp for the night. The track was rough in places but very doable. On the way across the Nullarbor Plain we came across a cave system, which contained Aboriginal paintings, and what appeared to be several blow holes above the caves. We also stumbled across the dog fence, a dead camel and a live dingo. The sunset and sunrise on the Nullarbor was an unforgettable experience.

On to the Great Australian Bight for a bit of whale watching! Head of the Bight at Nullarbor was a great place to view the Southern Right Whales and their calves. We even witnessed a great tail slapping event! We took a lot of photos that looked like floating logs in the water, at least we knew they were whales!

From the Bight, we headed back to Penong for the



night via a brief stop at Port Le Hunte, just across some wonderful salt lakes. Martin left us in the morning to continue on another adventure, and the rest of us moseyed back along the coastal route to Adelaide.

We managed to get in a bit more sightseeing. But first - Ceduna to replace a tyre that had blown out on the trip leader's caravan. Lessons learnt from this were: always stay at least 4 car lengths from the vehicle in front so as you have time to react and dodge the flying rubber, and check the manufacturing date on the tyre wall when you purchase new tyres as they have a use by date of 10 years.

One of the standout stops was Murphy's Haystacks; a group of Inselberg rock formations 40kms out of Streaky bay. The formations were caused by uneven weathering of pink Hiltaba Granite, and are magnificent. The granite itself is said to be some 1500 million years old.

Next, off to Point Labatt for lunch and sea lion viewing. The colony was actually at home, sunning themselves on the rocks below the cliff. Our adventure continued to the Talia Caves, where we got to see the wild ocean in action! We made it just in time as the daylight was dwindling, but well worth the stop.

We parted ways at Tumby Bay and continued the journey back to the Riverina.

Thanks again to the Gawler four-wheel drive club for inviting Wagga members to participate on this adventure, as usual it was a very well-run, unforgettable adventure. And a special thank you to Lyn and Max for planning the trip and ensuring everything ran smoothly!

First roll of the dice began the day with Stephen & Lisa rolling 22!! Setting the bar high for the rest of us. We left at 9.00am and headed for Swan Reach via Angaston. Drove past kilometres of amazing stone walls, apparently it took 2 men a long hard day of work to construct 6 feet of wall, -blows me away to think how many hours went into the walls we saw today!!

Arrived at Swan Reach for our first ferry crossing and shared morning tea, very windy but nice and sunny. The three little girls loved the playground. Another throw of the dice with Stephen & Lisa now on 29, Harpers & Earls coming up the rear with 15.....we won't mention the other scores.

From Swan Reach we headed to Walker Flat with a stop at the Big Bend lookout to enjoy the view of the River Murray. Managed about 6 drops of rain on the way to Walker Flat, for our second ferry crossing and next throw of the dice whilst crossing the river. Claughton's now have a score of 34 but watch out the Earl's are creeping up with a score of 23.

We left Walker Flat and headed to Mannum for our third ferry crossing and next roll of the dice, Claughton's now on 43, the Mulyk's are now runners up with 32!! Off the ferry and on our way to Murray Bridge for lunch.

Arrived at Murray Bridge and set up for lunch at Sturt Reserve, the little ones were kept busy with the swans and seagulls. Sturt Reserve was very busy with many families enjoying the sun and of course the Bunyip, that was very entertaining. We had the final throw of the dice and needless to say, with a total score of 58 the Claughton's were outright 1st prize winners. Peter & Joann came in last but did not miss out on a prize.

At 1.20pm we loaded into the vehicles and headed to the Round House for a very informative talk from the volunteers. We had a look through the house with it's many memorabilia items, the girls had fun in the old school room. The Six Sided Murray Bridge Round House

The Round House was built from 1873-1876 for Mr Henry Parker, the superintendent overseeing the construction of the first bridge to span the Murray River.

Constructed of local sandstone, its distinctive hexagonal shape reflects the style of a traditional English toll house, as the building is believed to have originally been intended to collect a toll for bridge crossings.


It is said that Mr Parker diverted labour and materials from the bridge project, with reports that "...he is doing what he likes, he is building a great stone house at the entrance of the bridge" and that "...some thousands of pounds are sunk here while the more important works of continuing the metal road to the bridge are neglected." The house came to be known as "Parker's Folly," a veritable mansion among the few pug and pine structures in the wilderness.

Being the first substantial building in Murray Bridge it played a significant part in the early history and development of the township. On completion of the bridge in 1879, the Round House served for several years as a school, post office, church and council chambers.


From 1884 the Round House was placed under the control of the Railways Commissioner. Referred to as Railway Cottage Number 146, for nearly 100 years the building was continuously occupied as a residence for senior administrative officers including bridge keepers, foremen and superintendents of the South Australian Railways.

The Round House lost its iconic hexagonal shape when it was extended in 1918 to accommodate the families of railway staff.

The Round House remained the property of the Railways until 1988 when it was purchased by the Rural City of Murray Bridge to ensure its ongoing conservation.
