

TRIP REPORTS

Caroona Creek Conservation Park - March long weekend

We ventured off from home on Friday afternoon, set up camp at 4.30pm in a very peaceful location that Bob had chosen. To our surprise, a special spot was saved for our size van as we were the last ones to arrive. We were greeted by John and Jane. A dry-as-a-bone coat was hanging neatly on a wire coat hanger swinging in the tree where Bob and Pauline had parked - was it to avoid the smell or just claim their piece of land? Bob, Pauline, Stephen, Lisa, Roy and Bronwyn had gone for a drive and walk-about exploring the new countryside.

FLYS, FLYS and MOSQUITOES. I wore my fly net the majority of the time so I could talk without eating them, but had some difficulty eating real food with my veil on. Actually the fly net was Max's because I left mine home! We all had a lovely catch up talk after tea around John & Jane's camp. 4 more vehicles camped near the toilet and shed area staying only the Friday night.

Saturday 7/3/20 we all ventured off after morning tea checking out Heyson shelter, another camp site that we could have stayed at. We crossed several times over the Caroona Creek, opened and shut many gates and stopped for sheep to cross the road. Travelled on White

Field Road and looked at some historic ruins. Went on Dust Hole Creek road - well, that certainly lived up to its' name, then back on White Hill Road following the Mawson trail. Enjoyed a nice lunch stop in the creek just off Mongolata Road. Someone came up with the idea of a "Gate Waltz" which allowed all vehicles to take it in turns getting their daily exercise and creating a different interest of opening and shutting the gates.

Back on Caroona Road to get to camp as some were getting anxious to start cooking for our shared



meal together. One thing was bugging me, the long drop had not been cleaned for quite a while. I prepared a bucket of disinfectant water and rag and began to walk up the rise for cleaning duties but I saw Roy heading the same way. It seemed he was going to get there $1^{\rm st}$, so I kindly, almost begged him to do my dirty work for me. All I could say "it's now a sheer delight" after a quick sweep away of the spider cocoons and webs. Thank you so much Roy! Another couple arrived with a large camper trailer. They came from the opposite entry to where we had and camped just up from our group for the night. They wondered how we got through as their travel was rugged.

The gas Weber Q seemed the popular form of cooking as it was still fire ban season so no camp fires. I really love the idea of a shared meal, no competition, just whatever we have on hand. What a fantastic social idea. Certainly didn't go hungry with Pumpkininni soup (pumpkin and zucchini) with bread as starters. Our feast comprised of Sweet and Sour Chicken and rice, Honey and Soy Chicken pieces and rice, Zucchini and Bacon Quiche, Lamb Roast with

Gravy, Honeyed Carrots and mashed Potatoes. To top off our full bellies we had to try the Chocolate Pudding for sweets.

Left about 9.00am Sunday on the same track as yesterday but travelled in the opposite direction only to find Dust Hole Creek Road again. Reached Dares Hill Lookout where a plastic rain water tank was placed inside an old stone square tank with a windmill pumping water to stock This fascinated me. troughs. Pauline dared us to eat some ripe red wild tomatoes from bushes on the roadside thinking she didn't want our company that night. But watching her eat them, I felt it was safe. They were sweet with



a hard small seed inside. Next onto Dares Hill Summit Road and Scenic Road where we watched the kangaroos eating these wild tomato bushes. Found some amazing white trumpet wild flowers some with a purple tinge to them. Arrived at the township of Mallett which



never fully developed after being surveyed, had 5 houses built in stone which were all abandoned.

Travelled on Ketchowla Road to find a station with Days Hut ruins built in the 1930s as a stopover place. A sign read Away Hill instead we stopped on Pandappa Road near the conservation park for lunch. Now onto Franklin Road, Scenic Drive 21 and into Terowie township to check out

the restored Railway Station. Time to enjoy a sit down and a beautiful ice cream, well, make that 2 (for each of us I mean), tasted so very good. Moved onto Whyte Yarcowie town, Ulooloo Road, Scrub Road, Banbury Road, Mt Bryan East Road, Wilkins Drive to finally reach Wilkins Hut. Some in our group had not seen this hut so they walked around the outside to check it out. Back on Mt Bryan East Road, Dares Hill Summit Road, past the old School and Church on Mt Bryan East Road and guess what, we found Dust Hole Creek Road once again!! Somehow we ended up as trip leader and Bob tail end, which was in reverse when we started the day. Back to camp to enjoy happy hour.

After tea, we all met at Bob & Pauline's camp where Bob set up photos, complemented with

background music, that he had taken of their 3 month trip to Cairns in Qld and outback Qld to come home. More food - Lisa made lovely scones with orange and lemon curd served with jam and cream. Delicious, thank you Lisa, topped the night off beautifully.


Easter 2020

We are looking forward to when we can hitch up the camper and spend some time with friends again.


We hope everyone had a nice Easter and are keeping well. Until we meet again stay safe.

1 dssp sugar

Sift dry ingredients together, add cream and water. Mould together.

Cuts 30 scones approximately, cook for 20 minutes. Add 5 minutes for extra tray.

BOOK REVIEW BY QUENTON

The Railway Dog - The true story of an Australian outback dog.

Written by author Olywn M Parker this true story follows the life of "Bob" the Railway dog in the 1890's. Olwyn has a link to one of the main towns in the story; Peterborough, as her grandparents ran the Hotel Peterborough in the 1960's.

The book is an easy read and follows the adventures of Bob, a scruffy brown dog, from his time in the city as a stray to his time in the railway towns of Peterborough and Terowie. Bought on a whim by a railwayman as a present for his wife, all the railway men knew him and he loved riding trains in the mid North, to the city of Adelaide and as far as Sydney. The men would look out for him, and ensure he got a feed. This is in the times of horse and cart and when the railways were a very important part of the country's transport. "Bob" became a legend and a part of Australia's rich railway history.

You may have seen Bob's statue in the main street of Peterborough or his collar at the National Railway Museum in Port Adelaide.

Written in 2011 the book is available for loan from the Gawler library or purchase online. A children's book called "Bob the Railway dog" by Corinne Fenton is also available from the Gawler library or for purchase online.
