#### **BLAST FROM THE PAST**

Taken from the February 2006 edition of the Club Newsletter and features the Earl's trip to Canberra, Blue Mountains and Sydney

## Canberra, Blue Mountains and Sydney

After packing the night before, we managed an early start, leaving Gawler at 6.00am Friday the 30th of September for 2 weeks exploring Canberra, Sydney and the Blue Mountains. Our lunch stop was at Robinvale where a lot of work is happening upgrading the old wooden bridge to a much larger concrete and steel version. We stopped at Hay for afternoon tea and although our original plan was to stop here tonight, we decided to travel on a bit further. We were making good time as the highway is now 110 km/h and the area was surprisingly green. About an hour on from Hay, we stopped at Darlington Point, a very pretty Caravan Park with lots of shade alongside the Murrumbidgee River. Back on the road we are now travelling on the Bruce Highway, a four lane concrete highway in parts. An Ice-cream stop at the Dog on the Tucker Box at Gundagai and then on to Canberra. This whole area resembled travelling through Mount Barker, just a lot more of it! Found our way through Canberra and stayed at the Queanbeyan Caravan Park.

It is now Sunday the 2nd of October & a sunny 24 degrees & we were at "Floriade", the famous Canberra flower festival at 7.55am for the 8.00am opening. This early start proved a good strategy all week to avoid the school holiday crowd, by the time we were coming out; the crowd was queued at the gate & later were shoulder to shoulder throughout the displays. We then visited the National Museum. This is a new building and quite unusual. Like most attractions in Canberra, the admission is free and well worth the time to look through. Next we joined a guided tour at the New Parliament House (after Deb's Nurses' scissors were taken away by Security!). We learned a lot about this very impressive building including a central water feature made of black granite from S.A's Black Rock (as seen during one of the clubs Mystery tours). By this time we were seasoned tourists, so joined a tour of Old Parliament House. The stories of past goings on were more interesting than the building; I imagined this historic building to be grander, although it was only built to be temporary. We managed to get to the War Memorial to witness the Bugle blowing at 5.00pm to close the doors of the "Unknown Soldier's" tomb.

Not such an early start today, but we did manage to enter The National Science and Technology Centre -"Questacon" just after its 9.00am opening. David thought this place was "heaps cool!" and we easily enjoyed a few hours here. It is really well set up for the kids.

We drove around the different countries Embassies which are all located in the same area near the Lodge. Many are quite elaborate in architecture and their gardens, and Security has been stepped up, with many featuring very new fences and gates. We saw about eight Federal Police cars in this suburb, and after our second lap, they seemed as interested in us as we were with the buildings, so we decided against dropping in and having a cuppa with John and Janet.

Although we felt "Museumed out", we headed up Anzac Parade to the War Museum. I had no idea it was so big and the displays were well set up. We found Arthur Earl listed on the Honour Roll, a relative from Mallala who died in WW1, and looked up more details on him on the computer. We could have easily spent more time here.

Our last tourist spot was to see the view of Canberra from the Telstra Tower. There are so many signals sent out from this tower; the remote central locking would not work on the Patrol, so we had to lock it the old fashioned way. The view from the top was great, although very windy.

We left Canberra and drove to Mittagong. The new freeway from Canberra to Sydney is 110 km/h and all the steep sections have been cut into the rock. We drove on part of the old highway and we soon learned how steep the hills really were. Cutting across from Mittagong to Katoomba we were amongst a lot of traffic and soon learned round-a-bouts are not only restricted to Canberra, they love them, they were everywhere!

We set up camp in Katoomba, which would be our base to explore the Blue Mountains. Our first point of call was Echo Point and the view to the famous "Three Sisters". The steep steps down to the sisters were cut into the stone in the 1930's and described suitable for "strong walkers" only. They were certainly steep and even David was complaining. The walk to Katoomba falls and down to the old coal mine was very pretty. Beautiful ferns, trees, birds, streams and waterfalls greeted us at every turn on our way down to the valley floor. Leighton and I opted to take the



"Scenic Railway", an open air carriage - the world's steepest railway - back up to Katoomba; certainly beat all those steep steps back up!

The next day we drove to Lithgow and then Clarence and rode on the "Zigzag Railway". On the trip back up the mountain the Steam engine was labouring hard and bellowing out a note loved by all rail enthusiasts, no matter what their age. Black soot and smoke -wonderful!

Many of the shops in the main street of Katoomba are the original shops built in 1915 -1920. The boys and I enjoyed a superb afternoon tea in "Paragons" an historic booth style cafe from the 1920's. With original rich timber and leather the decor matched the quality food served (and the prices).


Next day we went on more bushwalking to Wentworth Falls. More steep steps, great views and surprisingly hardly any tourists. We later found them in the main street of Leura, a pretty town with great shops, cafes and judging by the BMW's, Mercedes and Blonde Bobs, obviously the place for Sydneysiders to be seen on week-ends.

Following Trek notes from "4X4 Australia" we left the Camper trailer at Katoomba and headed to Yerranderie, an old gold mining town from the 1890's. We drove to Jenolan Caves and onto the 4WD Kowmung Fire Trail. Although only just over 100kms to the town, it took us nearly 5 hours. The Fire trail was very steep with large drainage humps -1st and 2nd gear low range. As it rained last night, the river crossing at the Kowmung Wild River was fast flowing and it's

depth a concern, so Deb took off her jeans and walked through to check the depth, with strict instructions (threats) -No photos!! It was just above her knees, so with seat belts off and all windows open we scrambled through and up the very steep bank the other side. -No drama!

Last night's rain and wind brought down trees across the track. Two we managed to clear, but two we had to manoeuvre around through the forest of trees alongside the track. We turned

onto Banshea road, a good forest track and then joined onto the Oberon-Colong Stock Route, good gravel, but with wash-outs, rocky sections and narrow mountain twisty bits. The pot-holes were so deep; they were only ~ full of water. We were glad to arrive at Yerranderie and the relative comfort of "Slippery Norris's Cottage", an old tin miner's cottage. It now boasts solar lighting, a gas fridge, a wood heater and hot showers, but still with the original rustic feel. King Parrots landed at the back door and after a while they would land on our arms and heads. Great fun and lots of Kodak moments.



We woke to a beautiful sunny day and explored the town and the old mines. The whole town is owned by a Sydney lady and managed by a caretaker -Martin, who was suffering sleep deprivation after caring for a Joey with regular bottle feeds through the night; its mother a victim of road kill. We really enjoyed our stay at Yerranderie, and it was great to walk around all the restored buildings including the Store, Two storey Post Office, Court House, Police Station, Church, Cemetery and numerous cottages amongst the large Gum trees and the green parklands in such a remote location. Many of the mines equipment has been abandoned to rust after mining Tin, Silver and Gold from 1890 to 1950.

Although it was sunny, on the road back through the mountains it became suddenly cold and there was white stuff on the side of the road. David soon learned that you get wet after a snow fight, so after earlier having the air conditioner on, we now had the heaters going!

We looked through the Jenolan Caves and oohed and ahead and took many photos like the Japanese tourists joining us on the tour. We warmed up by the open fire in the beautiful Jenolan House; a huge resort built in 1889 and watched the Bathurst race, happening only just up the road - Go Craig Lowndes! Don't let a tyre through the window stop you!

Back on the narrow windy road (some corners 15km/h) to Katoomba, picked up the Camper trailer and an easy run into Sydney.

We arrived through the traffic, still married, and settled into the Lane Cove Caravan Park. Only 10kms from the CBD and alongside the Lane Cove National Park, such a very peaceful spot with Parrots, Lizards, Possums and Kookaburras regular visitors to our camp site.

Quite warm today, so we took it easy and the boys played in the pool. After getting the run down from fellow park tourists we bought a weekly transit pass that would enable us to use Buses, Trains and Ferries to get around Sydney.

First stop was Sydney Tower and we could get a great view of Sydney and it also helped us get our bearings and plan our assault. (Don't mention assault in Sydney, there are security guards everywhere!)

Today was David's 12th birthday, so we went on the RSL clubs courtesy bus (should be named horror bus - running red lights, 95km/h in a 50 zone, red lining every gear change; up and down - no wonder the oldies spent big on the pokies, their hearts might not make the trip back!) from the Caravan Park to the Chatsford Club for a great meal and jet bus ride.

Next day was the Bridge climb. We had booked it months ago and now David is 12, he can also climb it. After going through the suiting up and safety demos we headed out to the bridge in a group of 12. The bridge is HUGE; we were clipped to a safety line the whole way. Quite a steep climb up to the top of the arch and great views of Sydney for as far as the eye could see. Our guide was Bernie and a real character. David described the experience as "Awesome" and Leighton as "Excellent!!" It was worth the money and a great experience.

We spent the next couple of days seeing all the touristy bits of Sydney including Darling Harbour, Circular Quay, The Rocks, and Bondi Beach. We were lucky with the weather, most days sunny and around 25 degrees.

We bee-lined for home with an overnight stop at Darlington Point Caravan Park just before Hay, and then an easy drive home to Gawler. We travelled 3,822km and averaged 12.8 L/IOOkm. Nissan Patrol 3.001 Turbo Diesel towing Spirit Camper trailer.
