GENERAL INFORMATION

Those of you with caravans or hoping to purchase one soon may find the following article interesting.

Caravan Council Press Release.

With an indefinite pause on international travel, there has been an explosion of caravans on our roads. While we would all like to think that caravans are built to rigorous industry standards this is often not the case. The following information comes from the Caravan Council of Australia.

Warning for Potential-Buyers of New Caravans

Any potential purchaser of a caravan needs to be vigilant to ensure that their proposed caravan is fully compliant with Vehicle Safety Regulations, as stated in the national Australian Design Rules.

The Federal government's Vehicle Safety Standards branch has recognised problems in the caravan industry, and is introducing a new Road Vehicle Standards Act in July this year. This will replace the Motor Vehicle Standards Act, which has been in force since 1989.

Caravan industry veterans warn potential buyers to be aware that there are currently many noncompliant caravans on our roads, and that the new regulations will not guarantee that all future caravans will be fully compliant.

The new safety and quality regulations will not apply to all manufacturers and importers. Manufacturers and importers providing caravans in small numbers will be exempt from having to meet the requirements of the new laws. Companies not subject to the new laws, are often new to the market, lacking the necessary resources and experience essential to the manufacture of safe and high-quality caravans. They often lack the expected professional after-sales service and repair facilities across the country. Industry insiders have long been worried that there are too many new manufacturers and importers competing in a very limited, and highly competitive, market.

Larger caravan companies will be given a phase-in period for the new requirements, so it may well be that the intended benefits of the new laws will not become apparent for up to a year after their introduction.

Unfortunately for many owners of defective non-compliant caravans, there are no retrospective provisions in the new Act. Despite the good intentions of the Australian Consumer Law to protect customers who have bought unsatisfactory or unsafe products, getting repairs and or replacements is often difficult.

Potential-buyers must research thoroughly, before deciding what type of caravan they really need that will suit their intended travel plans, and what they can afford.

There are free detailed independent Check-Lists available for potential-buyers of caravans, where:

- (a) An Evaluation can be determined of what they need / want / prefer in a new 'van, and
- (b) A Comparison can be made of what Makes and Models come the closest to matching the required and preferred criteria.

When someone buys a new car or truck, there is no need to know all the Australian Design Rules (ADR's) and other regulatory requirements, because Vehicle Safety Standards (VSS) must give prior approval to the Manufacturer's Compliance and Quality program. However, because of the permitted "Self-Certification", caravan buyers are not afforded the same degree of assurance.

There are freely available "Buyer-Assist" Checklists that include important questions that potential-buyers need to ask before purchase. It is prudent to obtain the answers in writing.

TRIP REPORTS

Although not strictly a Club trip report, it's a trip that Pete and I did in the week.

Blaze Aid

On Thursday 27 May 2021 Pete and I took part in relocating some Blaze Aid trailers, caravans and vehicles from Lucindale in the South East of the state to Mallala.

We set off from home at 6.45 am on an overcast morning. Heading to the top of Calton Road we encountered fog that stayed with us in various degrees of thickness until we reached Mt Pleasant when it suddenly cleared up. Dawn was breaking as we drove and the sun looked like a big fluffy fuzzy ball as it penetrated the fog, at least it made driving easier not having to drive into that big bright ball. We were heading to Keith where we were to meet the rest of the party representing members of the Toyota 4WD Club and members of the Mitsubishi 4WD Club at 10 am at the Keith Bakery.

We were the only people travelling from Gawler and we went via Palmer, Murray Bridge, Tailem Bend and onto Keith. I had my first drive of the Landcruiser on the Tailem Bend to Keith

section of the drive. Found it a bit more comfortable than the Prado as the suspension is harder and the Landcruiser doesn't "bounce around" as much.

At Keith we located the bakery meeting place just off the main road. We went in and ordered two coffees and a finger bun but I'd have to say that the two assistants weren't in any hurry and at times it took two of them to make the coffees while other customers, including us, just had to wait in line. It's not somewhere I'd recommend, certainly not in the same league as the Yankalilla Bakery!! Even though the premises is large, with a reasonable amount of seating, it's not a "bakery" as such as no actual baking is done there and the finger bun wasn't the best I'd ever tasted.

Once everyone had arrived and had their refreshments, we headed off around 10.30 am heading for Lucindale via Naracoorte. There were nine vehicles in all, and we arrived at the Lucindale Showgrounds cum huge caravan park around 12.40pm. We were met by members of Blaze Aid and a couple of ladies from the local community. After niceties had been exchanged, it was decided to hook up all the trailers to their respective vehicles. There was also a Blaze Aid Hilux Ute and a Blaze Aid Landcruiser both hooked up to trailers which were to be driven back by drivers who'd accompanied others down in their vehicles. All in all, there were 11 vehicles + trailers heading back to Mallala.

Once that was done, we were invited into the hall which was located at the back of the Showgrounds where we were offered a lunch of pumpkin soup, sausage rolls, coffees and biscuits. The volunteer ladies from the local community had made the soup and sausage rolls which were gladly received by everyone there.

While we were having lunch, the leader of the Blaze Aid group gave us some statistics. The trailers, caravans and vehicles were taken down to Lucindale by members of the Toyota 4WD Club following the bush fires in January 2021. 37 farms were affected by the fires and all those farmers needed help. Subsequently, one dropped out as they were able to handle things themselves, but the other 36 were saved around \$360,000 by the Blaze Aid volunteers turning up and helping reinstate fence posts and fencing - all in all 400 kms worth. He also said they had been well looked after by the Lucindale community.

We took our leave at approximately 1.30 pm heading towards Robe and the Coorong and passing the fire ravaged areas along the way. Clearing had taken place as there were huge heaps of burnt trees and shrubs in the paddocks. We all stopped at Robe allowing some vehicles to refuel or top up. From there we headed to Meningie which was a comfort and leg stretch stop. On we went via Tailem Bend, Murray Bridge, Palmer and Gawler. By the time we reached Gawler, it was dark then we did the final push to Mallala. Trying to find the shed in the dark which was also set back about 500 metres from the road proved to be a bit difficult, but we eventually got there. The shed was huge and each vehicle deposited its trailer among all the other Blaze Aid trailers that were already there, no idea how many but lots. Ours was numbered 27!!

We said our goodbyes to everyone and headed home as Pete had a Rotary Club meeting to attend and we reached home around 7.15 pm, eleven and a half hours after we'd left. We'd travelled over 815 kms round trip and!! It was a very I on g day and the "numb bum" said it all!! Initially our thought was to travel down on Wednesday, stay overnight, then head back Thursday with everyone else but on checking the calendar realised that we had a Gawler 4WD Committee meeting at our place on the Wednesday night before so that wasn't possible.

Blaze Aid is an amazing organisation and are to be truly commended for the hard work that is done over many months by their volunteers. As soon as there is a bushfire, they swing into action and go where they are needed. All the work of reinstating fencing and posts is done by volunteers as well as the cooking of meals for them. In lots of cases that's done by the wives or partners of the volunteers and they can spend many months at one place usually living in a caravan.

BLAST FROM THE PAST

The following is an extract from a Newsletter dated June 2006

Wollemi Pine - The Living Fossil

The Wollemi National Park covers 500,000 hectares and is found a couple of hours drive west of Sydney. This wilderness area is densely forested and has hundreds of unexplored canyons

with new rock art galleries being discovered all the time.



On September 10th 1994 David Noble a NSW National Parks Officer and avid bushwalker abseiled down one of these unexplored groves in the National Park and discovered a bizarre tree. This tree had leaves shaped a stegosaur's tail and bark that looked as though it was covered in bubbles. The species was one he had never seen before and he collected a sample to take back

to his colleagues. Botanist Wyn Jones was one of the first to see the leaf and remarked on how much it resembled a fern however Noble stated 'it's a bloody big tree'. The specimen was then taken to the Sydney Royal Botanic Gardens where conifer expert Jan Allen confirmed the pine was of the same family as the Norfolk Island Pine however was different enough to be a new species. On further investigation the difference was so great that it was labelled a new genus, Wollemia noblis.

The discovery of the Wollemi Pine made headlines around the world however the location of the pine was kept a secret to protect it from collectors, vandals and introduced plant disease. It was thought that as Australia dried out the rest of the Wollemi Pine population died out leaving an entire population of about 100 trees to survive in this unknown valley. What was more surprising was that the pine had escaped the ravages of fire that the park is prone to. Seeds and cuttings were then taken from the mature trees in the hope of establishing an outside source of the pine.

The initial propagation was carried out by the Sydney Royal Botanic Gardens however a company Wollami Australia is now responsible for the propagation and distribution of the pine.

Part of the sale proceeds go towards conserving this and other threatened plant species.

The breeders have discovered that the pine is easy to grow and tolerates a wide range of conditions.

"This is the equivalent of finding a small dinosaur alive on Earth" - Professor Carrick Chambers Director Royal Botanic Gardens Sydney December 1994






TRIP PLANNING

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
