Thursday 10th March

clear sky so the view was excellent. You could see Port Pirie and could just make out Whyalla. 

It is located on Main Street (Ayr Street) of Jamestown. This road sign is over 70 years old and was updated in 1974 when the "mileage" was changed to "kilometres." Read about Jamestown in the "Towns of South Australia" article in the

TOWNS OF SOUTH AUSTRALIA

In this series of "Towns of South Australia" I will explain a brief history of the town and how it got its name. This month we look at Mallala.

Mallala

Mallala is taken from the Kaurna Aboriginal word "Madlala" or "Madlola" meaning "place of the ground frog". The first land taken up in the district was by Phillip Butler in 1851 and his property was called "Mallala Station". The original homestead has been restored and is now owned by the Tucker family just East of the township. Smaller farms were sold to the settlers for one Pound an acre. Many of these early pioneers (including John Earl who walked his sheep from Angaston) still have descendants on the land or living in the town.

The 3 storey flour mill was erected in 1878 and was financed by the local farmers and operated as the Mallala Milling Company. The machines were supplied by James Martin and Co of Gawler. However, the Mill was not profitable and only operated until 1887. The Mallala and District Historical Society took over the Mill and opened a Museum in 1971. It is open on Sundays and well worth a look.

East Brothers Machinery Works built farm equipment for over a century in Mallala and their sheds and offices are still visible on Balaklava Road. They closed in 1970.

At Mallala's centre of eight roads (believed to be the only intersection of eight roads in the Southern hemisphere) sits the World War I monument (pictured). It is built with Angaston marble and granite stones. It's insignia reads "In honour of ten men who died in defence of home and liberty.". One of the men honoured is my Great Uncle A R Earl. At a cost of around 1700 pounds it was completed in 1922.

In 1939 the RAAF established a base just on the edge of town. Budget for the Mallala airfield was 233,000 Pounds. It was used for the advanced training for RAAF pilots. Suddenly the town's population swelled to over 2,000. After the war the buildings were used for newly arrived immigrants from Europe. The base closed in 1960 and many of the buildings were sold off. The hospital building is now a holiday house at Pt. Parham. In 1961 the Mallala Race Circuit opened. It continues today for many race events, car club days and Police driver training.

The railway came to Mallala in 1917 and proved a boom for the town. Goods could be ordered by noon and arrive that day from Adelaide. The Bellman aircraft hangars for the Mallala Airfield were sent by train in prefabricated sections.
