TRIP REPORT

2022 Easter at Coodlie Park (1)

On Wednesday 13 April we slowly travelled towards the West Coast as we had done for nearly every weekend and midweek in February and March for work. Couldn't believe we were heading on the same roads for a holiday!!!

We came across the most wonderful DRY salt lake in Lake Gilles Conservation Park but very surprised to see it full of water with lots of bird life. Several caravans were free camping there having just the perfect view. When we purchased meat from the Kimba butcher, who has lived there all his life, said he had never seen water in this lake, so it was a very special moment.

This lake was once a shallow ephemeral freshwater lake surrounded by open woodland. Weather became more arid



causing the flow off to become less than the rate of evaporation and developed into a dry salt lake. Water that drains into the lake is a combination of rain water and ground water containing a high concentration of salts, often more saline that sea water. Lake Gilles produces some of the most unusual forms of gypsum crystals in the world, including hourglass and arrow-head shaped crystals. The dunes around the lake were formed when gypsum



from the dry lake surface was blown by the wind and deposited on the lake margins. Gypsum mined from the site is used for agricultural purposes as a soil conditioner.

The Dinosaur Ant lives here and is the most primitive ant still alive today. It's critically endangered and threatened by fragmentation of its habitat. Thank goodness its nocturnal, looked scary with its big googly eyes on the picture board.

Such an interesting place, wish we could have spent a lot longer enjoying the water and

surrounding area but it was time to find our 1st free roadside camp between Kimba and Kyancutta and we pulled up at Koongawa free camp. Checked out John Darke memorial where he was speared by native aboriginals in 1844 while exploring the area. He died the next day and was buried at Darke Peak. This memorial can be seen from the roadside and in front of the Waddike Rocks. Such a unique place to stay but a weather change was on the way and we were flooded by insects inside and outside our caravan.

After an inside clean-up we were on our way Thursday stopping at Wudinna for a few supplies. We checked out Venus Bay before setting up camp at Coodlie Park. About 5pm we welcomed 4 vehicles from our club but sadly 2 vehicles needed to isolate and were unable to come. Some were anxious to find the correct spot, set up before getting dark with rain on the way

and prepare dinner. Early to bed that night but the next night everyone came to our campsite for 5 hours including Chris & Julie who arrived on Friday.

From this point I will let Sandra tell you about our adventures in her trip report.

Monday 18th, Tas had already left while the remaining vehicles left in drips and drabs. We stayed an extra night (5 nights in total)

Tuesday we left at 10.30 and slowly ventured to Loch where we stayed at a farmer's place in their paddock in preparation to do a job the next morning. They arrived home from their holiday after 6pm and we enjoyed a cuppa with them and discussed places to see at Port Lincoln and along the coast.

Wednesday was an early rise working on a silo auger. Once completed, had a late lunch but Max slept for $2\frac{1}{2}$ hours feeling very unwell.

Thursday we made the decision to slowly head back home travelling for $11\frac{1}{2}$ hours instead of continuing on our holiday until 30^{th} April. Lyn became ill 3 days later. Sometimes illness has other plans for us instead of a well-earned holiday.

We checked with Jo if anyone else had fallen sick at Coodlie Park but fortunate they had not which was good news to us.

2022 Easter at Coodlie Park (2)

15th - 18th April 2022

Jo, Peter and Charlotte, Tas, Sandra & Wayne met at Tarlee at 8am to head off to meet Bronwyn & Roy at Crystal Brook, then journey to our destination of Coodlie Park on Eyre Peninsula. The landscape changed so many times along the way, with dry sun drenched land to lush green paddocks full of livestock. We arrived at the park in the late afternoon having experienced some rain along the way.

Coodlie Park is a 3000-acre rural property with eco bush camping and swag hut areas to make it feel like the wilderness. They also have cottages for bookings. They have a camp kitchen,



large fire pit area and you can also have your own fires around your campsite, however, it would be good advice to bring your own wood! The shower was interesting, it was called a "bucket shower." You had to fill a bucket with warm water in the camp kitchen and take it over to the shower. There was a bucket on a pulley system in the shower which you lowered onto a shelf, you filled that bucket up and pulled it up. On the bottom of that bucket was a tap which made for a guick shower. No separate male or female showers, they are altogether with a shower curtains and a tarp down the middle. One long drop toilet which badly needed emptying. As there are so many areas to camp in it certainly didn't feel crowded. Max and Lyn were already there and set up with their brand-new caravan which was on its maiden trip. Finding a place was not a problem and everyone soon set up and

relaxed after a long trip. Tas well prepared with 2 tents just in case it rained too much and things got wet.

Good Friday saw us awake with lots of energy to greet the new day and to remember why we have an Easter break. The weather was overcast with the sun peeking through every now and again with the threat of more rain. Chris and Julie arrived to join us but stayed behind to relax while we went exploring. We headed off to the Talia Caves around mid-morning on dirt roads which were in good condition. There are quite a few steps to go down and up at the Caves, It is a large cavern with a honeycombed ceiling. Once you climb into the cave and look back the view of the ocean and the inside of the cave is spectacular; There are also robins nesting in the caves.

Next stop the Tub which is a large crater in a cliff 10 - 30 metres deep and 50 metres across. There is a tunnel though the cliff connecting the crater to the sea. A thin layer of much younger limestone, that was the roof, collapsed leaving an open crater. You are able to walk around the Tub, but I think it would be dangerous when wet. The views of the rugged Australian Bight are stunning, vast oceans with massive waves smashing against the coastline.

We turned off onto a dirt road with a few gates and the "gate fairy" was very generous to tail end Charlie. We went into Lake Newland Conservation Park for lunch and a look around, but were unable to go too far in as it was quite wet and boggy. The lake was discovered in 1839 by Edward John Eyre and named after his friend R F Newland. It is the largest coastal lake with a magnificent wetland area that is fed by rainwater filtering down through the sand dunes. The area supports wild ducks, geese and water birds around stunning white sand dunes and marshlands. It also has many marine fossils.

The office and pet enclosure are about 2 kms from where we camped so on the way back to camp we stopped for a look and to pat the animals. Lot of goats, turkeys (looking like they'd be good for Christmas dinner), ducks, geese, guinea pigs, rabbits and chooks. I went for a walk around the bush where we were camped and found they have quite a few Quandong trees growing.

Back at camp we spruced up for tea at the Port Kenny pub - some braved the showers and survived! Tea was a \$50 seafood buffet with dessert and a drink. There was no shortage of food, and all came away with full tummies. One of the highlights of the night was watching a door open and close when another one was used, and waiting for all the food to fall off the table that kept moving.

A relaxing start to Saturday and then off to explore the area of Streaky Bay. Memories for Tas as he worked in the area for many years, and had stories to tell about the area. A visit to Whistling Rock and Blow Holes was interesting and we stayed for quite a while. The roar of the waves smashing into the coastline at the blow holes was deafening and it took a bit of time waiting for the water to spray up through the blow holes to get a picture. There is a great viewing platform and some 360 metres of boardwalk



to walk along which makes it a lot easier. The views of the coastline were stunning, the crystal blue of the ocean and the waves so large and imposing as they smashed into the cliffs.

Next point of interest was Cape Bauer where we watched a young English tourist, with a drone attached to a phone, flying in and out to an island while videoing it. He was going to take it back home and show to all. I definitely need to get ours up and running. Lunch was on the beach front at Streaky Bay and we spent time building sandcastles and swimming with Charlotte.

A highlight of the day was going to Point Labatt and watching the sea lions and New Zealand fur seals. A viewing platform was on the top of a cliff overlooking where the animals swim, laze and frolic. Some young pups were in a pool playing around and it was such a wonderful sight to watch. Again, we were there for quite a while until we could see a white fog coming in towards the shore. Within 5 mins we could hardly seen in front of us and the sea lions and fur seals were out of sight. Some tourists arrived; turned around and left when they couldn't see anything. On the way back some of us went to see Murphy's Haystack, while others went back to camp for "happy hour" at Max and Lyn's caravan and, boy, what a great happy hour. We had lots of food, drink - especially red wine - and lots of stories. I think the more red wine the bigger the stories. Tas had some great stories, and he doesn't drink alcohol!!!!!!!!

Easter Sunday morning we arose to the delight of Charlotte and a lot of adults having chocolate Easter eggs for breakfast. Could not help myself when I found what the Easter Bunny had left me!! I love Easter!!! As decided by us the night before, Max, Lyn, Roy with



myself driving, headed off for the Colton wood fired bakery. It is a small bakery on the site of the old school. The guy there bought the property about 5 yrs ago and it is in an old stone building with a wood oven that was built by a surfie dude (his words) and he was a baker. He has now begun his own business after learning from the baker at Farina. He sells High top bread, some other breads, bread rolls and sticky fruit buns. He runs an "honesty system" on a stall selling the goods just outside the property. He told us he had been extra

busy over Easter after an appearance on TV and sold out fairly early. We just wanted to break the bread in half and start pulling it apart like we did as kids!! Once we were all back in the car the smell was just heavenly taking over the whole car! We all wanted to start eating!!!!!!!!!!

Once back at camp we had to have thick toast with butter and honey and didn't need anything else all day. Yummy yummy it was the best!!!!!!!

Off to Elliston late morning with a bonus coffee/hot chocolate on the beach front from a funky looking caravan. Had a look around the Elliston township and some of us ended up have lunch at the bakery while others were content with thick sandwiches made from the fresh bread from the morning.

We went along the Great Ocean tourist drive, with more stunning scenery of our magnificent country then drove along the Sculptures on



the Cliff road where some really great work was evident. There was an Osprey Nest made from copper and aluminium, head lands, three different size heads by Thomas Tesselaar (one of the heads had a massive beehive in the nose], Mara- Mother Earth is a Latvian traditional figure by Siv Grava, a Leafy Sea dragon which spins in the wind by Geoff Martin and many more. At this site we watched surfers battle the waves but then they had to paddle a good couple of kms out before they could reached the waves again.

We went back to camp where some people were planning on going home the following day with others moving on to more adventures. The rain decided to come down heavy for a while so we took the opportunity to do most of our packing up to leave early the next day.

Thank you to Jo, Pete and Charlotte for a great weekend and the chance to see some stunning scenery in our beautiful country.

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

ANSWER TO "WHERE AM I"

TOWNS OF SOUTH AUSTRALIA

In this series of "Towns of South Australia" I will explain a brief history of the town and how it got its name. This month we look at Mallala.

Jamestown

Prior to European settlement, the district was the home of the Ngaduri Aborigines. The first European through the area was the explorer Edward John Eyre in 1839. The first pastoral lease was granted to John Bristow Hughes in 1841. He called his property "Bundaleer". The township was named James Town after the then Governor of South Australia Sir James Fergusson and was gazetted in 1871. The town was modelled on Adelaide and consisted of a central business district surrounded by parklands with residential areas beyond. The Belalie Creek ran through the town. The streets were named after places in the Governor's home county of Ayr in Scotland; with Ayr Street being the main street. The growth of Jamestown to service the surrounding farming properties was astonishing. In 1877 over 100 stonemasons were employed in the town to construct the various shops, churches, and houses, and by 1878 most of the business area in Ayr Street had been built, including the oldest continuing Butcher shop in South Australia. To show the value the banks displayed to support the rich farming area, large imposing bank buildings were established (pictured).

The first Mayor, 28 year old Dr John Cockburn (later Premier of South Australia) showed inspiring leadership and Jamestown became a trendsetter for rural townships of South Australia. It was the first town with a tree planting programme in 1879 and by 1885 21,000

trees were planted. The Belalie Creek was dammed for ornamental purposes. Bundaleer Forest Reserve (the first forest planting in South Australia) occurred in 1876. Today the forest reserve is a pleasant picnic area with the newly built "Maple and Pine" function centre.

The railway reached Gladstone in 1877 and subsequently the narrow gauge (3'6") was extended through Jamestown to Peterborough. The Jamestown Railway Station was built in 1885 to replace the previous timber station which burnt down. In 1971 the Railway Station was turned into a Museum housing local history such as an Iron Lung (built by a local) and the history of Bundaleer Forest.

Located in Memorial Park is an interpretative display dedicated to one of Jamestown's most famous sons - the bush outfitter Reginald Murray R M. Williams (1908 - 2003) who is known for his distinctive boots and clothing. He lived his first 10 years at nearby Belalie North.

In 1962 a caravan park was constructed by the Jamestown Progress Association. In the 1970's the Lions Club and later the local Apex Club initiated a scheme to beautify the Belalie Creek. 1979 saw the opening of the 30 bed Jamestown Hospital. In 2014 "The Big Shed" sports stadium opened.


