Bute Silo Day Trip

Saturday 13th August 2022

Met at the Visitors centre at 8:30am and headed off for an adventure on a cold, windy and at times wet day.


First stop is for a coffee at the Mallala Coffee house in the original Uniting Church, this later becoming the hall when the new church was built next door. Quenton has since found out that in the church hall there is a stained glass window dedicated to his great uncle killed in WW1. Keryn and Wayne believed that the coffees were some of the best they have had in

a long time and the hot chocolate wasn't bad either.

Back in the cars and on our way to Bute with heavy rain and then the sun poked through the clouds briefly. Once in Bute we went to look at the silo art which was one of the most realistic and beautiful murals we have seen. The colours were just eye catching and stunning. The mural is of a young girl with her bike, a rooster on a fence that is just magnificent and would win show prizes, birds and wildflowers. When you stood and really looked at it there were lots of different things that you noticed - the



peace and mood rings, details in the wildflowers, rooster and house, also the pencil tucked



behind her ear.

Trying to stick to our timeline we next met Andrew and Meredith Pridham who look after the Gunner Bill's Heritage Centre. The museum is housed in the old police station, cells and court room. It is so good to see how the locals have pulled together to make sure their treasures remain in Bute and it is still a work in progress. They talked about Bute and the local characters in the area which was guite funny at times. We then walked around to the RSL to see again what the locals had in store. There was a massive flag with a white background 6 blue stars and a Union Jack in the corner draped over a billard table, it was massive. Up on the wall is a Bute Public School Old Scholars Honour Roll which was found at the dump. It looked like it was made of copper. People have donated or loaned uniforms, medals, photos and things brought back from the wars. Old machine guns are on display in the RSL which they got back after 20 year as they were stolen from the over the front door in the town hall, so now there are replicas in place at the town hall.



After thanking all for their time in showing us around we then headed to Port Broughton Bakery for lunch. I picked up some very large rolls but sooooo soft. Really great for salad rolls.

Next was Snowtown for a look at their painted water tower by Joel Moore. We had a bit of a drive around the town to find it. The paintings are of local people who have given their time to help make Snowtown a better place.

We travelled over back roads going to Blyth to the Waffle Ward for afternoon tea. YUMMY!!!!! We all only had half waffles as they were so big and there were lots of ohhh's and ahhh's as they were fantastic. There were lots of different toppings to try - I had banana, cinnamon and ice cream and Wayne had bacon, maple syrup, banana and


cream. We all rolled out of that café but with plans to return.

A family had bought the old hospital and turned it into accommodation, with virtual reality rooms and escape rooms with themes (4-6 people attempt to get out of a room using clues to open the door in a time frame,) it was great fun and made you think!!!!! Then afterwards you can go and fill yourself up with waffles! They also have some great posters with old time remedies and information to cure just about anything. It was good for a laugh:

- Horsford's acid phosphate
- Phosferine tonic wine
- Sanitized tape worms as a fat banisher
- Ambition pills for weak and nervous men
- Good old Bex powders
- On one poster was a warning
- "DANGER! DON'T SPREAD DISEASE BY LICKING YOUR FINGERS," clearly, they never had waffles back then.

Hoyleton was the next stop, some of the roads and paddocks were covered in water so they must have had plenty of rain in this area. You would not want to be going down any dirt roads around here. Hoyleton is a sleepy little hollow with not a lot happening, but they do have a beautiful old stone railway goods shed that was constructed in the late 1860's by S Saunders. It was the terminus from 1870-76 for the Port Wakefield-Hoyles Plain tramway. It was the first entirely agricultural line to be built in SA and it was also the first 3'6" gauge line. Horses pulled trucks up the line and they returned to the port by gravitation.





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TOWNS OF SOUTH AUSTRALIA

Towns of South Australia

In this series of "Towns of South Australia" I will explain a brief history of the town and how it got its name. This month we look at Terowie.

Terowie

Prior to the town of Terowie being established around 1875, the area was known as Gottliebs Well after the large pastoral property of the same name in the 1840s. By the 1860s this run had expanded to 407 square miles running 40,000 sheep. In the 1870s this larger holding was divided into smaller properties and the Hundred of Terowie was formed. John A Mitchell



laid out a private town in 1877 and built the Terowie Inn, the first building in the town. Mitchell donated money towards the cost of building a Wesleyan Chapel and in 1878 donated land for the building of the Terowie Institute built in 1879 (pictured). At the time it is said this Institute was more attractive than the nearby Peterborough's first Institute building, it's first stage known as a "shed". (A far cry from the "new" Peterborough Institute built in

1926).

Terowie is an aboriginal word meaning "hidden waterhole", first applied to Terowie Creek.

By the 1880s there was a Police station, a Post Office, churches, a flour mill, butcher, baker, blacksmith, a skating rink, a general store (pictured), two private schools and even an eye

Hospital. Terowie also featured a large Coffee Palace (pictured), a two storey Royal Hotel (burnt down in 1934) and Terowie Hotel (Formerly the Terowie Inn, the first and last hotel to close on 2 October, 2011) and the two storey Imperial Hotel. The English Scottish and Australia Bank had opened since 1878.

Hollywood actor-director John Patterson McGowan was born in Terowie in February 1880, his father was a railway man and many of "JP" movies have trains. (See mural depicting JP on the Terowie Motel (pictured)).

Most important of all, Terowie became the

terminus of the broad gauge Northern Railway Line on 14 December, 1880. Soon a narrow gauge line continued 20km North to Peterborough, where lines from Perth, Alice Springs, Broken Hill and later Sydney met. Thus, Terowie functioned for decades as the transhipment point at the railway break-of-gauge. When in 1898 the town hosted a busy break-of-gauge

its population was 800-900 people, many of whom worked for the railways. In its heyday 1940-50s the population was around 2,000 people.



Corregidor to Australia for the purpose, as I understand it, of organising an American offensive against Japan, the primary purpose of which is the relief of the Philippines. I came through and I shall return". The Advertiser printed the interview under the headline "I Shall Return". Today there is a plaque by the railway line misquoting the General "I came out of Bataan and I shall return". A broad gauge line was extended to Peterborough in 1969 and Terowie went from a thriving town to the well preserved "ghost-town" of today.

During World War II, the town was home to a busy staging camp for railway traffic going to Alice Springs and thus much of Northern Australia. While changing trains in Terowie on 20 March, 1942, United States General Douglas MacArthur was interviewed by "The Advertiser" regarding the battle of the Philippines. He said "The President of the United States ordered me to break through the Japanese lines and proceed from

Answer - Aboriginal Woman and Child Sculpture - Riverton

Located on the corner of Torrens Road and Elizabeth Street, Riverton, is a sculpture titled Aboriginal Woman and Child. The sculpture represents the continuity of Ngadjuri people and culture. The Ngadjuri, literally meaning 'we people' and known by neighbouring Aboriginal peoples as the 'hills people' or the 'peppermint gum people,' lived and thrived in this region for many thousands of years. They were distinguished for their high quality nets, basketry and possum skin coats. They occupied an important link in the trading and communications network across the country. It is hoped that this sculpture will act as an incentive for understanding and restoring Ngadjuri culture into the future. The sculpture was modelled and donated by Robert "Alfie" Hannaford AM, a local artist of Riverton. Hannaford modelled the final sculpture in his studio in the Riverton Gallery in 2014 and it was cast and prepared by Tim Thomson in the Adelaide Hills. The sculpture was unveiled by His Excellency the Honourable Hieu Van Le, Governor of South Australia in 2016.
