

RECIPE

CHRISTMAS FUDGE

- 2 tbsp heavy cream
- 4 tbsp butter
- 1 tspn pure vanilla extract
- $\frac{1}{4}$ tsp salt
- 3 tbspn Christmas sprinkles

Directions:


Step 1

Line an 8" \times 8" baking pan with parchment paper and grease with cooking spray. In a medium saucepan over medium heat, melt chocolate, condensed milk, butter, cream, vanilla & salt together. Stir until smooth then pour into prepared tin.

Top with sprinkles and refrigerate until set, approx. 2 hours. Cut into squares to serve.



TOWNS OF SOUTH AUSTRALIA

In this series of "Towns of South Australia" I will explain a brief history of the town and how it got its name. This month we look at:

Balaklava

Originally home to the Kauna and Peramangk peoples, Balaklava is 92 km from Adelaide and 25 km from Port Wakefield.

The first European settlers were James and Mary Dunn who in 1850 built a hotel on the Gulf Road to service the bullockies travelling from Burra to Port Wakefield.

The Bowman family (of Martindale Hall, Mintaro) owned a large area of land out from Balaklava, selling up in 1886.

The town was laid out by Charles Fisher in 1869. He built large grain stores on the tramway from Hoyleton to Port Wakefield to encourage farmers to settle near the town. The horse drawn tramway was taken over by South Australian Railways and converted to steam. The line was extended to Hamley Bridge and connecting to Adelaide in 1878. Refreshment rooms were at the nearby Bowmans Railway Station.

Balaklava got its name from The Battle of Balaclava in the Crimean war. According to

Balaklava Museum historian Norma Schopp, the correct spelling is with a "k" as shown on the original European maps of Crimea.

Balaklava Hotel was opened in 1871. Prince Albert Victor and Prince George (later King George V) visited the Balaklava Hotel for breakfast off their train ride to the Wallaroo mines. They even had a short walk around the town, as reported in the "South Australian Register" dated Wednesday 22 June,



1881. After this visit the name of the hotel was changed to Royal Hotel (pictured).

Many fine buildings like the banks, churches, post office and institute were built or added on in the early 1900's and these can be seen today. Some, such as the banks are now offices for local businesses.

Matchbox House is a fine two storey residence (pictured) built by Professor Frank Higham in 1906 who was a leading Vet in the area. Named by his wife Lucy, as she thought it looked like a "Matchbox" house and until recently was the only two storey residence in Balaklava.

The local newspaper "Plains Producer" was started in 1903 and continues to this day with offices in Balaklava and Clare.

The Balaklava Racing Club was also founded in 1903, boasts the



longest straight in SA and holds race meetings throughout the year including the Balaklava Cup attracting up to 16,000 race goers.



A famous son of Balaklava was Alfred "Alf" Traeger who came from a farm near Balaklava. In the 1920's he invented the pedal radio that enabled the Royal Flying Doctors to communicate back and forth with outback stations etc. A mural of his life is on the wall of the Balaklava Museum (pictured).

ANSWER TO "WHERE AM I"

Angas Family Memorial - Angas Park, just North of the Torrens River off King William Road, Adelaide.

Completed in 1915 by British sculptor William Robert Colton to the memory of George Fife Angas (1/5/1789 - 15/5/1879) patriot, politician, philanthropist, and his son John Howard Angas (5/10/1823 - 17/5/1904) pioneer, pastoralist, philanthropist after whom the town of Angaston was named and Angas Street in the city.

G F Angas was a founder of the South Australian Company (and termed the "Father of South Australia") and with the work on the ground of his son J H Angas opened up farmland to many new settlers of the Barossa Valley. They donated land for public buildings and churches and were exceedingly generous with charitable organisations. G F Angas lived at Lindsay Park, Angaston and his son J H Angas lived at Collingrove Homestead, Angaston.

The memorial was completed in 1915 and was situated on North Terrace, but when this road was widened was shifted to Angas Park in 1929.

Paid for by the granddaughter Mrs L G Angas of Hertford, England and supervised by grandson Mr C H Angas late of Lindsay Park, this memorial was built not of Angaston Marble as you would expect, but of Italian Marble chosen by the granddaughter. The bronze female winged figure is not an angel, but the figure of "fame". The palm frond she holds was missing for some years but has been re-made recently by Art-Lab, Adelaide.

GENERAL INFORMATION

This article appeared in this week's edition of Westprint Friday Five and it seems to have combined aspects of the trips Pete and I did earlier this year with Lisa & Steve as well as our recent trip with the Toyota Club. I'd have to say though that we didn't experience such a long list of problems on either trip. When we got to Cocklebiddy on our return in June with Steve & Lisa we found the caravan park closed due to plumbing issues encountered on the trip out in May. These people were a few days ahead of our recent trip in September.

Readers Stories - Anne Beadell Hwy by Allison

Saturday 17th September I left Melbourne and 'flew' across the highways and byways to Murray Bridge and onto Port Augusta to meet up with friends and complete final preparations (food that we couldn't bring from Victoria due to quarantine restrictions) before leaving civilisation. Monday 19th we left Port Augusta, spending a couple of hours investigating Woomera township (a tired, almost empty but curious little town with a great Tourist Centre cafe, rocket museum / info display and general store servicing the tourists) and onto Coober Pedy for our last night of flushing toilets and showers at the Caravan Park.

Tuesday 20th our adventures on the Anne Beadell Highway through to Neale Junction and south to Cocklebiddy commenced and included:

- Approximately 5700 kms home-to-home
- Approximately 1500 kms of this was dirt, dust, some mud and corrugations varying from minor to mostly horrendous (deeper than my ankle deep)
- numerous photo stops and inspections of original and replica Len Beadell signs
- visits to various points of interest like Mable Creek Station, Tallaringa Well, Anne's Corner, Emu township sight, Totems 1 and 2 (the original atomic bomb detonation sights and having my dose of radiation), Observation Hill, Great Victorian Desert, Serpentine Lakes, SA / WA Border, Ilkurlka Roadhouse, Neale Junction, Connie-Sue Highway and Rawlinna
- zillions and zillions of limestone rocks on the track
- 5 blown tyres all changed on the track
- a couple of car doors that fell open/off and fixed on the track
- a broken leaf spring which was repaired trackside and largely in the dark with ratchet straps and ingenuity.
- a holed sump that meant the oil (about 7-8 litres I believe) drained out of the engine, needing a 2.5 hour stop to dig a trench on the side of the track so the boys could safely work under the vehicle without it falling off jacks. Bash plates were removed and the sump was repaired and remodelled back to a usable shape, and then everything reattached to the vehicle. Between us all we had enough oil to get the vehicle going again
- 5 boiled batteries: for three of us it meant they operated their vehicles off their 'other' battery, while two had to be jump-started each time the engines were turned off

• a six-hour night drive from Rawlinna to catch up a day's driving, dodging even more of those blasted limestone rocks, hundreds of kangaroos and staying on the left side of the vermin-proof fence we had to follow. We arrived at Cocklebiddy Roadhouse at 11.30pm. I have to admit, that finding the other members of our group who travelled ahead of us from the sump repair, had sorted campsites and shower tokens, being able to visit a flushing loo and the prospect of a cooked breakfast the next morning was absolutely wonderful.

Sunday 25th Sept the Roadhouse Owners were relieved to find us 'lost lot' appearing and we savoured that cooked breakfast for a very long time before hitting the bitumen road (how silent it was) and heading east to Yalata Aboriginal Reserve for the night's camp. We understood it was supposed to be a short, easy 4WD track into our site but the WA / SA time difference (we forgot about losing 1.5 hours of time) meant we were driving the tracks in the dark and we eventually found a site big enough for all of us after about an hour (although not sure we were in the right spot). We found our way out the next morning and headed for Scott's Beach where we camped amongst the dunes with a small but warm campfire (despite the passing showers), a good long-drop 'over there out of the way' and stunning views of the Great Australian Bight. 27th we headed for civilisation and a day of rest, activity, car fixing / cleaning, sleeping, whatever you like based at the Shelly Beach Caravan Park in Ceduna - oh what a lovely day! Steve and I replaced our boiled batteries, Marcus helped me create a manual release for my boot lid (that had been jamming shut), I unloaded almost everything and cleaned all the lumps out of the car, reloaded and we all enjoyed dinners at the local eateries.

29th Sept we were off to the Gawler Ranges for the day and camped at Wattle Grove - a farm-stay just south of the Gawler Ranges. Three of our vehicles remained in Ceduna for more repairs and or further sleeping / resting but all caught up with us at either Wattle Grove or in Port Augusta the following night for our final dinner at the local footy club (all volunteers except for the cook so very pleased to support them) and then we all left early the next morning for the drive home to Victoria - 1300km later and I was home, tucked up in my own bed, with my own flushing loo and a shower I didn't have to wear sandals in! That was a nice change.

I never would have thought I would ever drive the Anne Beadell Highway, let alone half the Connie-Sue Highway as well. Thank you to Marcus and Ron for all their planning over the past three years of Covid cancellations and all the changes that created (closed communities, roads, tracks, etc). I have had a wonderful time, loved every minute of it and so thrilled to have driven some iconic highways of Australia. Allison.
