



TOWNS OF SOUTH AUSTRALIA

In this series of "Towns of South Australia" I will explain a brief history of the town and how it got its name. This month we look at:

HAWKER

Prior to the arrival of Europeans, the area was home to the Banggarla and Adnyamathanha Aboriginal people. An important Aboriginal art site is located in the Yourambulla Caves Historic Reserve just South of Hawker. Aboriginal paintings, for which ochre was used can be seen here, although access is limited as it is on private property.

From as early as the 1850's such stations as Arkaba, Holowiliena, Warcowie, Wilpena and Wonoka were established in the area. A small settlement, Hookina was laid out just north of the present site of Hawker and the Hookina Inn opened in 1861.

The town of Hawker was surveyed during March 1880 and was proclaimed on 1 July, 1880 to serve the railway which reached the town in June, 1880. It was named after George Charles Hawker (1818 -1895) who, along with two brothers, established Bungaree Station near Clare in 1841. He was a member of parliament from 1858 until his death (with a brief spell when he returned to England for a period). At the time of his death he was about to be knighted; this was awarded posthumously and his widow was known as Lady Hawker until her death in 1901. A wealthy Pastoralist, he was known as a good employer. Bungaree Station is now home to 4th, 5th and 6th generations of the Hawker family.

A timber Railway Station was built in 1880, burnt down in 1884 and the present stone Railway Station (pictured) was built in 1885 (similar to the Beltana station) along with a stone goods shed water tank. and The railway was active until the line was moved west of the town in 1956 and from then until 1970 was only used for rail traffic of goods and passengers to Quorn. From then it fell into disrepair until



1989 when the station was renovated to open the Old Ghan Restaurant. The old timber floor in the goods shed was used for the table tops in the dining room and still operates as a restaurant today.



Blocks of land near the railway station were highly sought after businesses auickly establish themselves. The prime corner block was sold for £246 for the Royal Hotel (now Hawker Hotel - pictured) and opened in 1882. The block selected for the Wonoka Hotel was £147. This hotel closed in the 1950's and was demolished in the 1970's as it was riddled with white ants. The General Store block was sold for £100 and was built mainly from iron and timber and is now The Flinders Food Co cafe

(pictured)(We visit for lunch on the "Tasting the Flinders" week-end). By 1886 the town's population was 350.

Wheat was successfully grown early on in the district and by 1884 two flour mills were operating in the town. Several droughts were experienced in the 1880's although 1889 had 550mm and the farmers experienced bumper crops. The store room of one of the mills was used for social occasions such as dances before the Institute Committee built their own Institute in 1893. Severe dust storms and dry years combined with good wool prices in the 1950's saw most farmers



rely on raising sheep and wool. Now only one farmer attempts to grow wheat in the Hawker area.

The Hawker Post Office and Telegraph Office was built in 1882 at a cost of £841. The Hawker school was built in 1883 designed for 60 students. The Wesleyan Methodist Church was built in 1884, the Church of England was built in 1889 and the Catholic Church in 1892.

Hawker had a licensed maternity home registered as a `Lying-in-Home` from 1897 until 1928, which was run by Mrs Lucy Ward. It was also known as The Gables and nearly 500 babies were born at the home before the Great Northern War Memorial Hospital opened in 1924, now known as the Hawker Memorial Hospital.

Hawker is known as "The Hub of the Flinders Ranges" and a "Heritage Walk" brochure is available from Hawker Motors Tourist Information Office to explore the town on foot.

GENERAL INFORMATION

RAWNSLEY PARK HISTORY

Rawnsley Park Station, on the southern face of Wilpena Pound, was settled as part of Arkaba Station in 1851. Arkaba, Wilpena and Aroona were the first pastoral leases settled in the Central Flinders Ranges. The initial pastoral leases were granted for a period of 14 years by the Colony of South Australia for what was then known as 'unoccupied waste lands'.

In 1953 Clem Smith purchased the portion of Ulowdna comprising 6253 acres. In 1963, another parcel (Section 9, Hundreds of Warcowie comprising 1200 acres) was purchased to make up the 7453 acres and the land was renamed Rawnsley Park Station. The property is now 29,000 acres, including part of the neighbouring Arkapena and Prelinna Stations, which was added in 2009.

The name Rawnsley comes from Rawnsley Bluff, the southern tip of the pound. This, in turn, was named after HC Rawnsley who arrived from England under false pretences claiming to be a surveyor. Rawnsley spent three months supposedly surveying from Mt. Remarkable to Wilpena before he was recalled by the Colonial Government. We will never know if the prominent landmark or the deception of the man was responsible for the naming of Rawnsley's Bluff.

In 1968 the first cabin was erected and sheep shearing demonstrations began. Originally tourism was developed as a sideline to grazing, however, tourism is now the major enterprise at Rawnsley Park.

ANSWER TO "WHERE AM I"

The Old Black Rock Station Woolpress, Orroroo main Street

This Woolpress was made in England circa 1840 and shipped to Black Rock Station in the 1850's. Black Rock Station was then owned by John Williams. The property sheared up to 30,000 sheep each year. It is unique in that it is operated by up to four men or boys turning a life-size screw while on a platform high above the press. Early research suggests it may be the only one of its kind in existence. After a two year restoration by volunteers Dean and Brian Keatley with community raised funds, it now sits in a purpose build building in the main street of Orroroo. We will visit this on the March long week-end.
