TRIP REPORTS

Tasting The Flinders Ranges Trip Report

Held 11/12 March 2023

Saturday:

Pete and I left home at 7.12 am and got to Tarlee, our meeting point, to find Quenton and Deb there and Pete and Jo joined us within minutes. All present and correct, we headed off just before 8 am.

We headed out via Riverton as the Clare roadworks were still ongoing. It was a beautiful morning with some cloud which cleared as we head north. Headed towards Spalding (comfort stop), turned left at Manoora and headed towards Mintaro. From Mintaro we found our way to Clare. It was a good run all the way and so much better than stopping and starting at roadworks. Onwards to Crystal Brook, Jamestown and Orroroo where we stopped at Maggie's Rendezvous café for morning tea at 10.30 am.

We left Orroroo at 11.10 am and headed to Hawker where lunch had been booked at the Flinders Food Co and where we met up with Bob and Pauline and Steve and Lisa. Some of us were rather full from morning tea so only ordered something light for lunch after which we visited the Jeff Morgan Panorama Gallery just a short walk away. What an amazing gallery this is with full size (floor to ceiling) panoramic paintings of the Australian outback together with the Flinders Ranges. This gallery also



housed collections of crystals and cars. Everywhere you looked there was something to see. After viewing this amazing gallery you could then wander through the gift shop and purchase any number of framed (and unframed) photos of Jeff's work together with any other knick knack that took your fancy.



We departed Hawker at approx. 2.20 pm and headed towards Rawnsley Park arriving around 3 pm. Everyone (except Quenton and Deb) set to and set up camp - Quenton and Deb were "slumming" it in a cabin instead! Happy hour was set for 4 pm in the air conditioned camp kitchen.

After all the nibbles were consumed, lunch and morning tea, no-one had a very large appetite for dinner, including ourselves, so only had something light for tea. Lisa had made and offered everyone sticky

date pudding with ice cream or custard (or both) so everyone was gathered around their camper and enjoyed this special treat. Thank you Lisa!! Lots of chatter back and forth ensued then it was off to bed for a relatively late night.

Sunday:

Up early, showered, breakfasted and prepared morning tea as there are no cafes where we are going today. We are off on a sightseeing trip taking Bunyeroo Gorge, a stop at Razorback lookout then shortly afterwards found a spot for morning tea. Off again and drove through Brachina Gorge - no Yellow Footed Wallabies



around today - back on the bitumen heading towards Parachilna where lunch had been booked. As we were dining at the Rawnsley Park Woolshed restaurant tonight, most felt a light lunch would be okay but the lunches varied in size from very light to much larger. Bob and Pauline shared a Feral Mixed Grill which was shown on the menu as a shared platter for two. Seemed



a bit small to me, more like a platter for one! Deb and I had what I thought would be a very small lunch - Pakoras - but when they arrived there was more on the plate than I could eat - so thankfully some kind people helped me out!! Thinking mine would only be a small serve, I also ordered a very nice Desert Lime sorbet for dessert - didn't really need it!!

The Parachilna Hotel has been upgraded and is very nice inside - certainly looked very different to the first time Pete and I saw it which was

about 40 years ago. The hotel also hosted an art gallery and there were some stunningly beautiful dot paintings by local artists - looking at them I was able to appreciate just how much time was involved in the painting of them. Just beautiful.

After lunch we left and headed towards Blinman, driving through the stunning Flinders Ranges scenery in almost perfect weather, low 30's. For those of us who still had room, coffee and cake was the order of the day at the Blinman café. I was just pipped at the post for the last quondong pie available. Oh well, never mind, I didn't have room for it anyway!!!

Leaving Blinman at 2.40 pm we headed towards the hidden gem WADNA in the Adnyamathanha region of the Flinders Ranges - WADNA is the local Aboriginal word for Boomerang. This shop sold authentic Aboriginal artefacts produced by the local people - paintings and wood carvings which were done mainly by members of one family. They also arrange cultural tours which included a "tag along" tour - they said since Covid people felt more comfortable in their own vehicles. They were very friendly and were quite happy to chat and explain how carvings were done and also explain the meanings of some of the paintings. I almost bought a painting but to be quite honest I had no idea where I would hang

it as I don't have all our paintings and pictures displayed now. Now that we know this place exists, I just might be tempted again in the future. Website: www.wadna.com.au.

We left WADNA around 3.10 pm heading back towards Rawnsley Park. We took a drive up to Stokes Hill Lookout and enjoyed 360 degree views of the surrounding countryside. Back on the bitumen to Rawnsley and the campsite.

Dinner was booked for 6.30 pm at the Woolshed. The food was excellent and the company great. I almost missed out on dessert but amazingly after being advised there was none left, two were miraculously found - I only had one of them!! Sated, we headed back to camp.

Monday:

Up early today as it was pack up day. The wind was a little cool but there was a beautiful red sky. While in the throes of packing up, Quenton and Deb came over to say their goodbyes - it took them no time at all to pack up the cabin and they were looking forward to coffee in Hawker!!



Finally, at about 9.30 am we were ready to leave so said our "goodbyes" to Lisa and Steve and Bob and Pauline and headed off with Jo and Pete in the lead. It was going to be another beautiful day in the Flinders with temperatures around 30 degrees - much warmer up there than at home. When we got to Hawker, Jo and Pete filled up at the local petrol station then we were off.

It never ceases to amaze me how many channels and creeks have been cut through the ground by water in the Flinders. Seeing them it could be assumed that the Flinders Ranges get constant rain throughout the year. I'm sure our original pioneers thought the same thing too and that's possibly why they tried to settle in those areas.

We passed through Carrieton, via the scenic route, before getting back onto the main road. Orroroo might be a lunch stop if the cafes are open. We were in luck and stopped at Maggie's Rendezvous café for an early lunch then back on the road via Peterborough, Spalding, Booboorowie, Waterloo, Marrabel, Hamilton, Allendale and Kapunda to Gawler. Took our leave of Pete and Jo and headed home.

Thank you to Quenton and Deb for arranging the great weekend and to everyone else for their great company.

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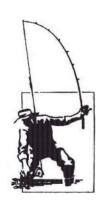

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TOWNS OF SOUTH AUSTRALIA

In this series of "Towns of South Australia" I will explain a brief history of the town and how it got its name. This month we look at:

SEDAN

With no permanent surface water, the local Ngaiawang Aboriginal tribe, who lived along the river, only passed through this area. The first European occupants were farming large pastoral leases from the 1850s. In 1869 Johann Wilhelm Pfeiffer came to this region looking for new land. He founded the township of Sedan and sponsored many new settlers to the area, many were German Lutherans seeking religious freedom and the British who sought better living conditions. Pfeiffer named the town Sedan after a town in France that marked a significant battle in the Franco-Prussian war (1870) and settled his family into a pug and pine and stone cottage on the western side of town (still standing).

Land was donated in 1873 for the first Lutheran Church to be built and this stone building was dedicated in November, 1873. A new larger church "Pilgrims of Zion Lutheran Church" (pictured) was built with a fine bell tower and bell and was dedicated in November 1923. The Vestry remains of the first church. In 1876 the Lutheran Church Hall was built and the Lutheran School was conducted here from 1876 - 1917. The school teacher's house was built behind the church in C1878 and is still lived in today. This school teacher's house was the first Sedan Post Office from 1891 - 1916.

The Sedan Flour Mill (still standing) was built in 1881 and commenced operation in 1882. A large well had to be built for water, but was closed in the 1890s due to insufficient water. It opened again in 1903 with a gas fired charcoal engine, in 1928 a Benz diesel/oil engine ran the mill and changed again in 1958 to electricity. The mill

produced good quality flour until its closure in 1966.



By 1884 the town had seen the addition of the Lutheran School, a bank (Commercial Bank), a Blacksmith Shop (who built the current gates in front of the Lutheran church), Saddler, Post Office, General Store, Tea rooms and the Sedan Hotel built in 1881.

Water was a problem for the townsfolk and long running District Clerk H.A. "Papa" Zadow (District Clerk 1902 - 1946) established a bore to be sunk in 1906 and water storage tank (still standing beside the Hotel) for the use of the townsfolk. This low quality water served the town until it was eventually connected to Murray water in 1967.



Railways were being built around the state and to help the cause of the petitioning public such as Papa Zadow and Towitta farmer William Shannon, a luxurious two storey guest house (pictured) was built in 1894 to convince the authorities of the credibility of the town's accommodation and bid for a railway. The combination of a recession, drought, and the commencement of World War One saw a delay in the arrival of trains until the 13th October, 1919 (Sedan was the terminus). In 1964 the line closed, but was re-opened

for 12 months in 1967 to cart for the Swan Reach Stockwell pipeline. The timber railway station on the edge of town is no longer standing.

The Lutheran School was forced to close due to World War One and a government school was built in 1918. This school ran until 2008. The school bell and 1968 Jubilee plough are now displayed in front of the Lutheran church.

The Sedan Hall (Institute) was built in 1912 on land donated by Martin Lehmann. The first public school was located here from 1912 - 1918 and the Congregational Church used it for services 1912 - 1919 until their church was built (now used by the CFS). A supper room was added in 1953 and the foyer and toilets in 1970. The original pressed tin decoration around

the stage is in immaculate condition today.

A 1906 built Drapery was purchased in 1913 for use as a Police Station (now a private residence) and cells were added out the back. The Station closed in 1971 and the cells are now located at the Cambrai Agricultural Museum.

The Sedan Recreation Park was built in 1914 and football, netball, cricket and cycle racing were held here. The Sedan Brass Band used the purpose built 1935 Rotunda (pictured) which is still in reasonable condition today.

Petney's garage was opened C1920 and sold T model Fords. From 1956 to 1981 it sold GMH Holden cars and Fergusson tractors and is now the Sedan Post Office and fuel store. Here you can pick up a brochure "Sedan's Heritage Trail" and the historic buildings on the trail are numbered with a brief written history.

QANTAS TOURISM AWARDS

Seven South Australian tourism operators were rewarded at the 2022 Qantas Australian Tourism Awards in March, placing them among the nation's best businesses.


EMERGENCY PLUS APP

The Emergency Plus app is a free app designed by Australia's emergency services and their Government and industry partners. The app uses GPS functionality built into smart phones to help a Triple Zero (000) caller provide critical location details required to mobilise emergency services.

The "what3words" simple three-word code will locate the caller although address, latitude and longitude details are also displayed. Emergency+ also includes SES and Police Assistance Line connections as options, so nonemergency calls are made to the most appropriate number.search "Emergency plus app" to easily download the app to your phone. You never know when you may need it.

ANSWER TO "WHERE AM I"

Mortlock Library Clock, State Library, Adelaide

This 1887 Clock is 63cm across the dial and pendulum is 43cm in length. It is an "8 Day" clock and is wound every Monday morning by a Librarian using the original small brass winder. It was last overhauled in 1999. It was ordered by Postmaster General Sir Charles Todd on a trip to London in 1885 by English clock maker

E Dent & Co. (The same makers who made "Big Ben" in Elizabeth Tower, London) at a quoted price of £50. It seems the clock maker lost money on the deal, but was determined to supply the quality clock for such an important installation.

The Mortlock wing was originally called the Jervois Wing after Governor Jervois, but changed to the Mortlock wing after \$1.8m was left to the State Library from the John Andrew Tennant Mortlock (1894-1950 of Martindale Hall, Mintaro) estate after his widow died in 1979. Martindale Hall and the land was left to the University. Mortlock drove fast cars, liked to have a drink, owned racehorses and greyhounds and enjoyed his yacht "Martindale" (which was later used for the war effort in WWII). Mortlock and his wife, Dorothy Elizabeth, also liked books, and it was his wish that at the time of his wife's death (they had no children), his vast wealth was to go to the Library.
