



Jamestown Trip Report

16th- 18th September 2023


We met at Tarlee with our trip leaders Quenton & Deb, Julie & Chris, Martin, Keith & Di, Wayne & Sandra.

Meeting us up at Jamestown: Pauline & Bob, Peter & Sandra, Roy & Bronwyn.



Heading off to Jamestown on a day filled with a beautiful sunny blue sky and splashes of yellow everywhere as a lot of canola crops are in full flower. Our first stop was Bungaree station for morning tea. The resident Dachshund dog was our greeter, but with strict instructions not to be given any food no matter how she looks at us. Coffee, hot chocolate and a very yummy apple cake and cream. Next stop Jamestown to the caravan park to set up, lunch and relax for a while. The park is very lovely with lots of new buildings and ones that look new but have been renovated. Great grassed area to have happy hour on or just a chat with people, the camp kitchen is new and very well set up.

Visiting Penn Cottage Museum of Pressed Glass, and what a surprise it was!!! Keith & Margaret Conway have been collecting glassware from all over Australia and have made their home into a museum with over 15,000 pieces, one dating back as far as 1846 made in England. It all started with a \$2 emerald glass bowl from a clearing sale, the sun's rays passing through the bowl was so beautiful that they were hooked and wanted to collect more. A lot of their married life has been spent touring Australia and sometimes overseas to add to this stunning collection. Margaret is blind, but she can tell you all about the pieces of glassware that you inquire about, and Keith is there to add to the stories as well. One time they were on a cruise around New Zealand and missed the ship in Christchurch







lost track of time. They rang their daughter, who is a doctor and in the middle of delivering a baby, to see if they knew where they were, the ship had sailed and they were left with only the clothes on their backs and baskets full of pressed glass. They had to fly to Dunedin to meet up with the ship again.

There were bottles, vases, figurines, jewellery of every shape, size, and colour. They also have a collection of uranium glass that shines up a spectacular green colour when it has a UV light on it, however, it doesn't look much in a plain light. A milk jug & sugar bowl in cranberry glass is beautiful and the red colour depends on the temperature that it is made at and is very rare. The cost of the visit is

\$10 and includes morning or afternoon tea which is lovely, cooked and made by Margret.

We met up at the camp kitchen (The Hub) for happy hour and to listen to Ali Cooper (the owner) talk about how she came to own the caravan park (The Park), how run down it was and the upgrades that she has done to get it to the wonderful place it is now. She is such a livewire and only wants the best for Jamestown and to see it come alive once again. She also talked about marrying into the Cooper family, one of the biggest land holders in the area, and living and working on the land for CC Cooper & Co Pastoral properties. The talk was very interesting and at times very funny - Ali is a great speaker and it was great that she gave up her time for us.



Next on the agenda was a walk to the Commercial Hotel for dinner, great food, and company. Only trouble was that Port was put out of the finals so now no S.A. teams in the finals.

Sunday up and on the go by 9am for a tour around the area and to see what interesting bits of history and information Quenton has found for us.

Caltowie: Overnight the town became a camping spot for bullock teams hauling timber from the forest in the area and copper from the mines and the town commenced in the early 1870's. Caltowie's claim to fame is the birthplace of SA's brothers of invention Don & Edward (Ted) Both, who invented the portable iron lung and humidicrib which saved countless numbers of lives. The Flour Mill Office is the last remnant left from the thriving Caltowie Flour Mill complex which employed many people in the area. In 1881 farmers paid five pounds a share in the mill which was a rail siding. It operated until 1947.

Apilla: Established in 1872 but named Yarrowie (aboriginal word for hunting ground). 1877 the name was changed to Appila-Yarrowie then changed to Appila to remove confusion with other similarly named towns e.g. Tarcowie, Terowie, Yarcowie etc. It was quite a large town with 4 blacksmiths, 3 carpenters, Protestant, Catholic and government schools, post office and telegraph station plus many more stores and businesses.

We went to Appila Springs for morning tea and what a gem of a place with a picnic & camping area with toilet, by a picturesque spring.

Tarcowie: (meaning place of washaway water in Aboriginal.) This was due to the large number of creeks in the area. We had just a fleeting drive through the small town which was proclaimed on 20 May 1875, the hall was built in 1906 and the hotel which is being renovated and hopes to be re-open for the 150th celebrations on 28-29 October 2023. The cemetery for the town is interesting as it has graves dating back to 1876, and one grave is located in between the hotel and hall (not in the cemetery) which is believed to be dated back to 1860's. After this we had a quick trip to Magnetic Hill.

Yatina: Stopped here to have a look at the hotel which is owned by Tim O'Dea. Tim took us on a tour of the hotel, which his father bought in the 1960's, and e regaled us with lots of stories and tales. He is renovating it but holds "shows" there every now and then. It was built in 1874 by Rowland Nutt, the same year the town was proclaimed. He had big visions for the town but, sadly, it never really got off the ground as the railway that was promised never came. The hotel has just had a horror movie filmed there and the movie people paid out quite

a lot of money to fix the top storey veranda, the stairs and other bits and pieces. Movie is

"The Royal Hotel" and is being released around Christmas time, starring Hugo Weaving.

Mannanarie Public Hall: We met up with Mary Ann Young, who is the daughter of Norm Young (Gordon Rex, younger brother to Norm was killed in a flying training accident near Angaston in 1943 aged 19). She showed us around the hall which was built in 1912 and had renovations done for their centenary in 2012 and was owned by the Methodist



Church (as it was the original church site). It was bought by the Hall Committee in 1983 and continues to have regular meetings and get togethers at the hall for the local people. Beautiful lead light windows are at the entrance of the building and there is an Honour Roll of Men from the area who went to war in 1914-1919. Little is left of the town, the old school building is now a private residence, but they did boast a racing club. The town was severely affected by the Black Sunday Bushfires in 1955.

Louden Brae: A short drive from Jamestown is Louden Brae state school that R M Williams first attended until he was 10 years old. It was established in 1905 with one teacher and closed in November 1950, and has been vacant ever since.

Great drive around the countryside with lots of information, quiet night back at camp as some were leaving early in the morning while others going on to another journey.

We set off from Tarlee turning right past the pub and made our way to the farm stay where Helen would help instruct Jo, Sandra, Keryn, Julie, Sandra and myself on the art of backing a caravan. As we got closer to the hills the rain began but luckily soon cleared however the day continued to be rather windy and cold.

On arrival we all drove to the shearing shed had a quick look around and left Peter, Wayne, Chris, Brent, Pete and Quenton to set up morning tea and to discover what else the farm stay had to offer. Quenton had plans to make scones for morning tea and we were to gather later to cook our evening meal over the campfire.

With all of the ladies together we set off to learn the art of backing caravans and trailers in the flat area by the entrance to the property. Once again, the rain came, and we huddled into Keryn's van to discuss our goals for the day. Helen then proceeded to instruct us individually on how to back the caravans in a way we all understood and could easily practice. Once the basics were understood we all went to a separate area and with the bollards in place practiced backing through a space (thanks Wayne and Sandra for the loan of the Bollards and

I promise none were hurt during the morning session). Ava also joined in taking action shots with the camera and helping Nan back through the Bollard space.

Practice session completed, we made our way back to camp for a late morning tea and scones cooked by our own scone connoisseur Quenton. Thank you it was a great morning tea.

The farm stay is a lovely area with a kitchen and dining room off of the shearing shed with all the amenities you need including mood lighting. There was also a bathroom, BBQ area, fire sites and well-presented caravan sites further up the hill, Quenton and I stayed in the

cottage a 2 minute walk from the shearing shed and past the kangaroo sitting happily in the paddock.

After morning tea some of us continued to practice our backing skills while others set up their camp and discussed the plan for tonight's meal. Thank you Helen for coming out to teach us how to back the caravans and trailers in a relaxed environment.

The great cook-off campfire was started about 2 pm to get the coals ready for cooking, while the clay was clean the wind was figure and the

the sky was clear the wind was fierce and the best place to be was in front of the wood heater in the kitchen or, for the enthusiastic, playing table tennis nearby.

Once the coals were perfect, we started the cooking, meat first, then the vegetables. Unfortunately, the wind made the temperature a bit variable but with some fine tuning the cooking continued. The menu was roast pork, lamb and chicken with baked potatoes and

TOWNS OF SOUTH AUSTRALIA

In this series of "Towns of South Australia" I will explain a brief history of the town and how it got its name.

This month we look at -

Georgetown (first surveyed as George Town)

John Bristow Hughes (1817 - 1881) established Bundaleer Station (native word for "among the hills") in 1841. He expanded the station to 313 square miles and ran 1,000s of sheep. He sold it to brothers Charles and George Fisher in C1854 for £32,000 making a huge profit.

George Woodroffe Goyder became Surveyor General of South Australia in 1861 (a position he held until 1893). Following the Strangways Act of 1869, which saw large pastoral properties resumed for closer settlement and more intense farming, Goyder set out a series of "Hundreds" which were an area of 100 square miles and he planned to survey a town in the middle of every Hundred, thus having towns approximately 10 miles apart. George Town was surveyed in 1869 in the Hundred of "Bundaleer" and with Redhill, were the first towns surveyed in this way. George Town was set out with North, South, East and West Terrace's with surrounding parklands. With a wide imposing main street, it was designed to be the "Hub of the North". Unfortunately, the planned railway was instead built to Jamestown in 1878, and Georgetown did not get the railway until 1894, by which time Jamestown was established as the main town of the north. Interestingly George Town did not develop far to the east of the main street, and East Terrace was never built!

The name George Town was probably named after Sir George Kingston, a local MP at the time. It is also suggested it could be named after George Fisher who co-owned the Bundaleer Station. The main street is called Fisher Street. The General Store and Hotel called the town Georgetown (all one word) and this seemed to stick.

Henry and Sarah Kewson from Rhynie purchased lot 29 in 1871 and built the Georgetown Hotel. They had four daughters. Sadly Sarah died in 1873 and Henry died at the age of just 41 in 1876. Henry's sister Mary Kewson, aged 36, took over the running of the hotel until the four daughters came of age. From 1889 the four daughters ran the hotel until 1902 when

they sold it to the SA Brewing Company, who built the two storey hotel we see today (pictured). Part of the original building still survives as the rear wall of the hotels kitchen. The stables at the rear would agist horses while their owners enjoyed food and accommodation in the hotels top floor bedrooms. The stables were re-modelled in 1936 to house motorcars and its rear wall was restored in 2021. Today the hotel offers food Thursday to Saturday nights and comfortable single and queen rooms.



The Areas Hotel was built diagonally opposite in 1875, lost its licence in 1931 and burnt down in 1947. The Georgetown Council built chambers on the site in 1958. (now CFS communications building.)



The Georgetown General Store was built in 1876 and first traded as "Gulnare Stores". John Joseph Angley built a new modern store in 1912 (pictured) and was the first building in town with electric light, which was run from a generator behind the store. It was described as good as any store in the state. He and his wife Gertrude had 8 children (pictured in 1920), who all worked in the shop over the years. Goods for the store by were ordered phone Thursday mornings and delivered by train Friday

morning which was collected from the Railway Station in the store's 1926 Buick buckboard and later a Vanguard Ute. Groceries would also be delivered around town in these vehicles and goods would be "booked up" and paid at the end of each month. Leo Brogan started work at the store as a 13 year old in 1914. Interestingly he saved the life of Mr and Mrs Angley from drowning after their car was washed away from a flooded creek and was awarded a medal and the promise of a 'job for life' in the store. He indeed worked at the store for 51 years until retiring in December 1965 because he did not want to



learn the new decimal currency (\$ & c conversion on 14th February, 1966). The store ran for many years as a "Four Square Store" by Ed (Edmund (known as Eddie as a child & Ed as an adult) is the youngest boy in photo) and June Angley until 1990. It boasts a large cellar (used to house Mens/Boys wear and boots) and the store is one of the few old style General Stores still trading in the state today. Step inside and you can see the original counters, pressed tin ceiling, wall shelving and the original, although worn timber floor. 14 of us called into the store for a coffee and a look in March, 2022 on the way home from the Laura week-end.

A Catholic Parish was formed in 1874 and built a new church in 1925. A St Joseph school was built, and this building is now the tennis clubrooms. A Baptist church was built in 1874 in a unique octagonal shape and was replaced by a larger church in 1910. A Church of England church was built in 1888, ceiling added in 1892, porch added in 1898 and is still used as the Anglican Church. A weatherboard school was built in 1877, replaced by a stone building in 1924 and only recently closed with current students bussed to Gladstone.

An Institute was built in 1878 at a total cost including land and furnishings £1,868 with a debt of £883. It was described as the best looking building in the main street. The Savings Bank of SA demanded payment in 1888 when the debt was £907. (banks were nasty then too!.) To save the building being sold, the Council took over the debt. Lester Travelling Pictures showed movies in the hall and in 1940 the hall committee installed a projector box which enabled locals to keep up-to-date with Newsreels of WWII. After advice from an Architect, it was decided in 1962 it was more practical to build a new hall instead of renovations. By the town centenary in 1969 \$1,000s were raised towards a new hall and the new Georgetown Memorial Hall was opened in 1973 (pictured).



The town's population peaked at 650 in 1919. In the 1920's many farms had tractors which meant less farm hands needed and the ability to farm larger areas. Thus many less successful farms were taken over by larger successful ones and with the advance of road transport the town's population has dropped to 186 (2021 Census). I still find it an interesting town!



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

ANSWER TO "WHERE AM I"

Sir Walter Watson Hughes statue, Adelaide University, North Terrace, Adelaide.

Sir Walter Watson Hughes (1803 - 1887). Born in Scotland he arrived in Adelaide in 1840. He took up land at Hughes Park, Watervale in 1845, the vast Wallaroo Station in 1854 and Gum Creek Station, near Burra. In 1859 Copper was discovered on his Wallaroo Station and he became a major shareholder in the Wallaroo Mine Co. This was the first Australian company to pay over £1,000,000 in dividends. He was known as Captain Hughes. After donating £20,000 to establish the University he was known as the "Father of the University". In 1880 he was knighted for his services to the South Australian community. He returned to England and died there in 1887. Having no children with his wife Sophia (although he had a son, John Sansbury with an Aboriginal woman in 1854 whom Hughes paid a pension via his step-dad Tommy for life) he left his properties to relatives. Hughes Park was left to his nephew Sir John James Duncan and now is run by sixth generation Andrew and Alice Duncan. His statue was carved by Francis John Williamson (reputedly Queen Victoria's favourite sculptor) and presented by the Duncan family in 1906. Sir John James Duncan left £50 in his will for the cleaning upkeep of the statue. In 2006 a re-enactment of the unveiling ceremony took place with Walter Hughes Duncan and Jock Duncan present. Ex AFL player and former Australian of the Year Adam Goodes relates his ancestry to Hughes in the SBS TV show "Who do you think you are?" and is filmed together in front of the statue.

Port Hughes was named after him.
