

TOWNS OF SOUTH AUSTRALIA

In this series of "Towns of South Australia" I will explain a brief history of the town and how it got its name.

This month we look at Undalya-

Undalya is an almost forgotten town between Rhynie and Auburn in the Clare Valley grouped around the Wakefield and Pine Creek junction. The name Undalya was given by the Ngadjuri people and means "water holes", while the surrounding district was known as Kercoonda meaning "camp near water". Due to the water hole of the now named River Wakefield, it was a popular camp for a large number of Aborigines.


On one of his expeditions, explorer Edward John Eyre camped at Undalya and commented on the large amount of water in the River Wakefield as well as the availability of the local blue limestone.

A thriving township started and in 1848 the first Post Office was opened. The town was officially gazetted as Undalya in 1859. Those transversing the Great Northern Road (now known as Horrocks Highway) and locals soon called for the need of a bridge to cross the often swollen Wakefield River. In 1855 a bridge was opened with the stonework by renowned Auburn stonemason Joseph Meller (see Towns of South Australia - Auburn - November, 2022) with a wooden overway. One of the most impressive bridges in the state followed, this current bridge, affectionately known as "The Basket Bridge" (pictured) was built in 1879,

proudly showing the maker's nameplate of J. Hooker, Maker, Adelaide, 1879. It has taken the full force of many floods and at one time was the biggest onespan bridge in South Australia. bridge was bypassed with a new bridge slightly to the east in 1950 and today only serves local residents. National Trust of South Australia is support funds to conservation of the Undalya bridge so it doesn't fall further into disrepair. (Maker - J (James) Hooker owned the Lions Foundry at Kilkenny. Originally



starting business in Hindley Street, Hooker set up the latest world class machinery including the "Lion", a riveter run by hydraulics with a 40 ton pressure. In 1881 he employed 58 staff. His biggest work was the construction of the Algebuckina Railway Bridge over the River Neales on the Oodnadatta Track. 19 100 ft spans (587m) opened in 1892 and until 2014 was the longest bridge in South Australia (South Road Superway now takes that honour) and is listed number 9 out of the top 10 bridges in Australia by Australian Geographic.)



The Undalya Hotel, (now a private residence, pictured) lists the founding publican as Henry Handford Chandler 1865 - 1867, but "The Queens Head" (now a ruin) opened earlier. James Owen ran the hotel from 1869 - 1870 and his step-son Henry Walker Owen took over in 1870. (Interestingly Henry was born Henry Walker on the "Buffalo" on its journey to South Australia on 29 November, 1836. After his father died, his Anna Sophia married mother James Owen and Henry took on the

surname of his step-father keeping "Walker" as his middle name). Henry moved to Pt Lincoln to run an hotel, married Hannah and had 11 children. William & Johanne Isaacson ran the hotel 1872 - 1887. I believe it was at this time the attractive front rooms were added. Their son John (born in Undalya 1862) ran the hotel from 1887 to its closure in 1904. It is said there was a shooting at the hotel; where John shot at a customer who, on being refused service, had jumped the counter to serve himself!

The Bible Christian Church was built in 1859 (pictured) and a school was also started here in 1860 with 29 children on the roll. The Roman Catholic Church of St. Patrick was built in 1866 by the Jesuits of Sevenhill, and was used as a Christian school, closed in 1915 and later demolished (plaque, pictured). The graveyard alongside the church is



still operating and contains the grave of Patrick "Paddy" Michael Ryan,



who discovered copper at Tiparra in 1861, which was the start of the famous Moonta mine (visited by the Club, November, 2023). The property owner Walter Watson Hughes granted Paddy a reward of a pension for life of £6 a week and a 1/10 share of the mine. Paddy, fond of a drink, died of alcoholic poisoning in the Leasingham Hotel 9 months later! His share reverted back to Hughes' company, but his

widow, Alicia, was paid the £6 a week.

It was mooted at a school meeting in December, 1867 to build a new school building and warned "of the evil of not sending your children to school". In May 1873 it was reported that funds had been raised to build a new schoolroom and residence, so a new school was

established at Undalya (pictured 1880, with girls playing crochet out the front of the school). The last dates I can find mentioning the school is a letter to the Herald" "Kapunda 23rd October, 1908 by 13 yo Veronica Robinson describing the Undalya school, and a mention in the "Kapunda Herald" of Undalya school teacher Mr C V Miller hitting and killing a hare while cycling near Undalya in 1911. (Interestingly I saw 2 large hares



in the town when I visited to take photos.)

In the 1870s, a butcher shop was run by George Clarke, but I have not found any mention of a General Store, although a jewellers shop was operating nearby to the butchers shop!

George Henry Michell established a large wool scouring operation in Undalya in 1870. Buying wool from the area's farmers, scouring it in large vats by the Wakefield River and shipping it to London for auction. He expanded the operation in 1896 to a large red brick factory in Hindmarsh. After George died in 1918, the company was managed by his 4 sons. In 1972 it moved to the current premises on Main North Road, Salisbury. It handles 15% of Australia's unprocessed wool and is still owned and operated by the sixth generation Michell family.

If you have never seen the bridge, it is worthwhile driving through this picturesque little village.

ANSWER TO "WHERE AM I"

Sculpture of Sir Hans Heysen. Main Street, Hahndorf.

Sculpture by Robert Hannaford AM

Sir Hans Heysen OBE (1877 - 1968) was one of Australia's greatest landscape painters. He moved to a 36 acre property just outside of Hahndorf "The Cedars" and built Australia's first purpose-built studio. "The Cedars" contain many beautiful Gum trees, some over 600 years old. He increased his holding to 150 acres to protect these trees and encouraged farmers to do so. He travelled to the Flinders Ranges to paint with his Ford Model A and 1931 folding caravan (pictured). With his wife Selma "Sallie" he had 8 children including

renowned artist Nora Heysen. You can visit his house and studio (changed little since the 1920s) and enjoy tea, coffee and cake at the newly opened Cedars Cafe and Tea Rooms in the restored old stone laundry/ tack room.

The sculpture was unveiled in August, 2023. Sculptured by Riverton artist Robert "Alf" Hannaford AM. Sir Hans Heysen was a mentor to Hannaford in the 1960s. Hannaford has many sculptures around the state and Adelaide including a sculpture of a Ngadjuri woman and child at



Riverton (Where am I? - September, 2022), The Hand memorial in Pioneer Park, Gawler, Don Bradman at the Adelaide Oval and Queen

Elizabeth II in front of Government House. The late Queen sat for a rare live sitting for Hannaford.
